

TEDDY'S LIFE IS THREATENED

NEW YORK, March 23.—That he has received many letters from mail cranks threatening his life was admitted by Theodore Roosevelt. The letters were first heard of in Portland, Maine, and Boston, where extra precautions to protect the colonel were taken. Roosevelt would not state where the letters came from, or what they contained.

BOSTON, Mass., March 23.—Colonel Roosevelt's train was late in arriving here today and he was forced to rush across the city to catch a train for Portland, Maine, where he speaks tonight.

The former president is accompanied on his trip by Medill McCormick of Chicago, one of his chief supporters. Colonel Roosevelt is scheduled to speak today from the rear platform of his train at Dover, N. H.

Warren, declares that it is too hard work to keep the paper going, and says that the Appeal's present fight with the United States courts and the post office department over the alleged Leavenworth prison scandal is the paper's "swan song."

ISSUE TEN MILLION BONDS TO IMPROVE RIO GRANDE

NEW YORK, March 23.—Final approval has been made of the arrangements for the proposed issue by the Denver and Rio Grande railroad of \$10,000,000 seven per cent adjustment income bonds, by the directors of the company, according to announcement made here today. The money thus raised is to be used for the immediate improvement of the road.
