Four Scotch Lassies With Lulu Glaser in "Miss Dudelsack"



During Lulu Glaser's career on the comic opera stage she has been called upon to wear many picturesque and effective costumes, yet none have had more colorful or becoming effect than the Scotch kilts which she dons in her latest operatic vehicle, "Miss Dudelsack." When the dainty Miss Glaser comes to Medford theater next week in this latest Viennese musical importation, she will be seen for the first time by a Medford audience in the plaids and tartans of bonnie Scotland, and it is said that no ball-gown or comic opera costume ever became the heroine of "Dolly Varden" more than the Stewart plaid, the rakish cap with its eagle feather, the Scotch stocking and the accoutrements of the "Clan MacHumber," which she represents.

Although "Miss Dudelsack" is from a Viennese source, its scenes are laid in the Highlands and many of its characters wear the tartans of authentic Scottish clans. In some cases
