MILTITIA QUIETS ROCK ISLAND

ROCK ISLAND, Ill., March 28.—With 600 militiamen patrolling all the city's streets, Rock Island is quiet today after two days of political rioting including one fatality, serious injury to many, two of whom may die, and an attempt to assassinate Mayor Schriever. All saloons remain closed. Six arrests have been made by the soldiers. It is feared that resentment against Mayor Schriever, which is still running high, may cause renewed rioting at any time. Fresh fuel was added to the indignation of the rioters by the mayor's action of calling on the governor for state troops.

CUDAHY BURGLAR DECLARED INSANE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 28.—Following Mrs. Jack Cudahy's testimony that she believed Morris J. Condory entered her Pasadena home at the instigation of someone desiring to harass her, a jury in the superior court here declared today its belief that Condory is insane. Final disposition of his case will be made late today by an insanity board. Condory was charged with attempted burglary following his alleged entrance to Mrs. Cudahy's home in Pasadena.

MICHIGAN TO VOTE UPON EQUAL SUFFRAGE

LANSING, Mich., March 28.—A resolution to submit woman suffrage to the voters of Michigan in a constitutional amendment at the next election was adopted in the house here today by a vote of 75 to 19. A similar resolution already has been adopted by the senate. The galleries of the legislature were packed with women, and the wildest excitement and cheering followed the announcement of the vote in the house.

GRAND JURY REFUSES ACTION IN BRANDT CASE

NEW YORK, March 28.—The grand jury which has been conducting an investigation into an alleged conspiracy to "railroad" Foulke E. Brandt, former valet to Mortimer L. Schiff, refused today to return any indictments in the case. Brandt contended that he was given a 30 year sentence in Sing Sing on a "trumped up charge of larceny to shield a woman member of the Schiff household." He has served five years in the penitentiary.

NO EFFORT MADE TO LOCATE ELOPING WIFE

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28.—No effort has been made to locate Mrs. Eleanor Hoyt Hiehorn, wife of Philip Hiehorn, or Attorney Horace Wylie of Washington, with whom she is alleged to have eloped. It is supposed that the pair are living on an island near Monte Carlo. Mrs. Mirtha Pearsall, sister of Hiehorn, at whose home he committed suicide, is prostrated. Friends are arranging today for the funeral.

INDIAN WOMAN DEAD AT AGE OF 107 YEARS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 28.—Clara Citalez, 107 years of age, last of the San Juan Capistrano Mission Indians, is dead at her home in Los Angeles. Her funeral will be held tomorrow in the old Plaza church, several stones of which she laid when a girl.

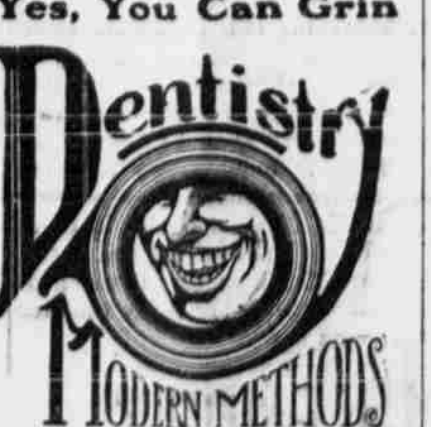

ASK ROLFE TO GIVE 'EM WORK

SAN FRANCISCO, March 28.—Spurred to action by a visit to his office in the city hall of 400 idle men, begging for work, Mayor James Rolfe today is planning ways and means to care for San Francisco's army of 40,000 unemployed. The police attempted to prevent the body from entering the city hall, but after the mayor learned of their presence he ordered them admitted to the supervisors' room, where he heard their complaints. "We want a place to sleep," the spokesman said. "We want to eat three meals a day. Also we want work, but particularly a place to sleep and eat. Unless we receive immediate relief somebody is going to suffer financially. There will be no violence, but we are going to eat."

OLYMPIA, Wn., March 28.—A victory for the fruitgrowers and cannery men of Washington is shown in the announcement today by the Northern Express company that it has made a cut of one-half in the rate on fruit.
