MADE RECORD FLIGHT FROM LONDON TO PARIS



MONS. SALMET BEGINNING RETURN FLIGHT TO LONDON. Henri Salmét, who made a record flight without stop from London to Paris on March 7 last, is back at the Bristol school at Hendon, where he is the chief instructor, having made a slow return flight in the face of storms. A violent head wind prevented him going further than the French coast after four hours of the return journey, though the entire outward passage of 222 miles had been made in less than three hours.

CONGRESS MEETS TO HEAR MADERO

MEXICO CITY, April 1.—The congress which assembled today marks the second meeting of the legislative body since Madero assumed the reins of government. President Madero's message is expected to be read tomorrow. Numerous measures intended to bring peace to the nation are incorporated in the instrument. Among the most important is a land law which calls for the distribution of much valuable land to the people, entailing the expenditure of millions. The progressive element is backing the plan for the land distribution, but the independents are opposed to the scheme.

SPEND MONTH CAMPAIGNING

SAN FRANCISCO, April 1.—Nearly a solid month of speech making in California is the La Follette campaign, according to Walter Houser, political manager for the Wisconsin senator who today enlarged upon the plans of his candidate for the presidential nomination. La Follette will conduct an old-fashioned, thimble making campaign in California, said Houser. "He is in fine health and will speak no less than fifty times in every section in California a halls, theatres, tents and from the rear end of trains. He will speak wherever there are people to hear his message."

TWO MORE TO RUN FOR CLERK

G. A. Gardner of Talent and W. E. Quisenbury of this city have announced their candidacy for county clerk subject to the republican primaries on April 19. N. J. Naragon of Eagle Point was already in the race. The only other candidate for the office is W. H. Miller of Gold Hill. Mr. Gardner is well known in the valley and his friends state that he will make a strong race. Mr. Quisenbury has been a resident of Medford four years and is well known. He is said to be well qualified for the place. W. T. Beveridge will probably announce his candidacy for the legislature on the republican ticket and will oppose John H. Carkin and J. A. Westerlund.

MEXICAN REBELS PLAN TO SMUGGLE ARMS BY AIRSHIP

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—That the Mexican rebels are planning to smuggle arms and ammunition into Mexico by means of aeroplanes is indicated in dispatches received at the war department here today from El Paso. Colonel Stever, in charge of the American troops at El Paso reported that two aeroplanes of French make had been held up by custom officials. It is believed the aeroplanes were consigned to rebel leaders. General Orozco, commander-in-chief of the rebel forces, it is reported here, is about out of ammunition as a result of ten days of battling with government troops, and it is believed he will resort to any means to secure rifles and ammunition which are necessary to carry on his fight. PRICKED BY CONSCIENCE SAFE CRACKER CONFESSES SAN FRANCISCO, April 1.—Stung by a lively conscience, Harvey Sprague, ex-safecracker and ex-army deserter, cannot rest until he has answered to the law for all his misdeeds. Having already served a term in a military prison as a deserter Sprague today gave himself up to the police and asked that he be sent back to Salmon City, Idaho, to be punished for cracking a safe three years ago.

CHAMP CLARK CLUB TO FORM

A call has been issued to the democrats of the county who favor Champ Clark for the presidency, to meet at the Holland hotel, Tuesday evening at 8 p. m. This makes the fourth political club to be organized in Medford, the Taft, Roosevelt and La Follette clubs having been organized previously.

HARMON OUT OF RACE IN ILLINOIS PRIMARY

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 1.—With only two days in which to file primary petitions for presidential nominations no petitions have been filed here yet today by Governor Judson Harmon of Ohio or Congressman Oscar Underwood of Alabama. Supporters of Woodrow Wilson declare this means that Champ Clark, Harmon and Underwood have made an agreement by which they are to partition the west, east and south among themselves for the purpose of making a united fight against Wilson in the four cornered battle for the democratic nomination.

THREE STATES TO HEAR ROOSEVELT

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—Plans for a busy three days speaking tour through West Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio and Maryland for former President Theodore Roosevelt were announced here today. Roosevelt will leave New York tomorrow afternoon, speaking on Wednesday at Charleston, W. Va., Ashland, Olive Hill, Moorehead, Winchester, Lexington, Frankfort and Shelbyville, Ky., and ending with an address in Louisville in the evening. Reaching Cincinnati on Thursday, Roosevelt will deliver a series of rear platform speeches from his train between that city and Parkersburg, W. Va., where he will speak on Thursday night. On Friday the colonel will address the voters of Keyser and Cumberland, Md., and Martinsburg, W. Va., arriving back in New York Friday night.

KILLED IN SALOON ROW: MURDERER SURRENDERS

BAKER, Ore., April 1.—John Irvine today is in the county jail here charged with the murder of J. A. McCraw. Following a quarrel in a saloon at Whitney, near here, Irvine shot McCraw and killed him instantly. Then he telephoned Sheriff Rand at Baker, saying: "I have killed a man; shall I come to jail and be arrested?" Rand told him to wait where he was and Irvine waited till Rand went to Whitney and placed him under arrest.

HORSEBACK RIDING STRENUOUS FOR FASTER

SEATTLE, Wash., April 1.—Strenuous horse back riding yesterday has left Dr. Linda Burfield Hazzard in so exhausted a condition today that she was compelled to forego a scheduled automobile ride with Bernard McFadden, the noted physical culture exponent who is visiting here. The fast specialist showed the effects of her exercise in her drawn cheeks, and she was much paler today than at any time since she began the scheduled thirty day fast. She has lost about three pounds in the last twenty-four hours.

BLOODHOUNDS ON TRACK OF ALLEN FUGITIVES

MOUNT AIRY, N. C., April 1.—Bloodhounds are today tracking a trail through the mountain thickets of this section, where the pursuing posse has discovered traces of Sidna Allen and Wesley Edwards, the two remaining fugitives of the Allen band. All escape is guarded and a capture is expected tomorrow. The food supply of the bandits is known to be exhausted. A battle is expected when they are located.
