SON KILLS FATHER IN SCUFFLE OVER MOTHER

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 2.—H. B. Haywood, a carpenter, was shot and killed here today while scuffling with his son Robert, who was trying to protect his mother from the father. The elder Haywood, according to the stories of the mother and son, became abusive toward his wife following his demand that she prepare a meal. She ran from the house and brought back her son Robert from a nearby residence to protect her. When the two entered they say the father threatened to kill them, brandishing a revolver. The son grappled with him and in the scuffle four shots were fired. Three entered the father's body, killing him instantly.

BRITISH MINERS VOTE DOWN PEACE PROPOSALS

LONDON, April 2.—At 6 o'clock tonight it was announced from the headquarters of the Miners' federation that the vote on the question of accepting the government minimum wage bill and resuming work in the coal mines stood:

For resumption 125,000; against resumption, 135,000.

It is estimated that 40,000 miners who voted in favor of resumption returned to work today.

If the proposition is rejected, the operators predict a wholesale desertion of the ranks of the striking miners.

STOP SALE OF I. W. W. PAPERS

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 2.—Efforts of the I. W. W.'s to sell a San Francisco evening newspaper containing accounts of the free speech fight here have been blocked. As fast as the newsboys appear on the streets, they are arrested, taken to the police station, where the papers are taken from them and burned and then released. In this manner hundreds of the northern papers have been destroyed and very few have been sold.

Pierpont Morgan for \$400,000 as spurious, noted Egyptologists here today hailed the American financier as "easy Morgan." The alleged early Christian manuscripts were declared to have been found in excavations in Upper Egypt.

LONDON, April 2.—No reduction in estimated expenditures is shown by the annual budget, issued in the house of commons today by David Lloyd-George, chancellor of the exchequer. The budget also carries no increased taxation.

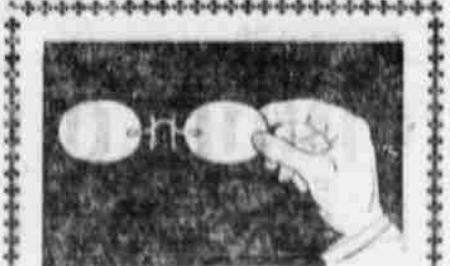

GOT \$1500 FOR KILLING WOMAN

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., April 2.—That he and a man named Knight forced an entrance into the apartments of Dr. Helen Knabe, in Indianapolis, several months ago and murdered the woman by cutting her throat with a stag-headed butcher knife as she lay in bed was the startling confession made by Seth Nichols, a former sailor on the U. S. S. Dixie, an auxiliary cruiser, Nichols avers he was paid \$1500 for killing Dr. Knabe. His statement follows: "We easily forced an entrance to the apartment house, I tipped to the woman's bedroom with Knight following. She was lying on her back with the bedclothes barely reaching to her breast. "As I reached her side she moaned and opened her eyes. I shall never forget those eyes! They are with me day and night. I lunged and buried the knife in her throat as she turned toward me. That's all there was to it. She died without a struggle."
