In Victoria last week they "took a flyer" on the national sheep-league run at Liverpool, investing 20 cents each in a ticket. They drew out just \$15,396.

Jews Observe the Passover

NEW YORK, April 2.—The one million Jews of Greater New York, in common with their brethren the world over, yesterday celebrated the feast of the passover, or Pesach. It is the spring festival of the Jews, and in ancient times was the first of the three great pilgrim feasts, when the people of Israel gathered from the remotest sections of the Holy Land and went up to Jerusalem to offer their thanks in the temple. The festival was ordained to commemorate the redemption of the children of Israel from their bondage in the land of Egypt, where they had been held as slaves more than 400 years.

Iowa Evangelical Conference

CEDAR FALLS, Ia., April 2.—Between seventy and eighty clergymen and a number of lay delegates are in attendance at the Iowa conference of the Evangelical association, which opened here this morning with a meeting of the board of conference examiners. The conference will continue through the entire week and will close on Sunday evening with a sermon by Bishop Bowman of Allentown, Pa.

Seek Italian Murderer

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 2.—Police are searching today for Locato Rosari, a Porto Rican, suspected of the murder of Filomena Rodriguez, who was found in a lodging house here with her head nearly severed from her body. She had been dead three days. Jealousy is believed to have been the motive.

RECORDER HAS BIG MONTH

The month of March was one of the busiest ever experienced in the county recorder's office. Recorder Colvig taking in as fees the sum of \$808.75. This is one of the largest sums during a single month taken in by the office. It is an increase over March, 1911, when the receipts were \$677.33, and March, 1910, when the receipts were \$733.50.

AFFIRM JUDGMENT TO BOYS AGAINST GREAT NORTHERN RY

SAN FRANCISCO, April 2.—Judgments aggregating \$59,000 against the Great Northern railway in favor of Wayland and Lewis Sloan, minor sons of John Sloan, injured in a collision of freight trains at Calena, Wn., were affirmed by the United States circuit court of appeals here today. The boys were injured while attending to livestock and household goods which the family was moving from Everett, Wn., to Montana. Wayland was given \$14,000 and Lewis \$16,000.

Bitter Saloon Contest in Illinois

CHICAGO, April 2.—A bitter contest between the liquor interests and the anti-saloon forces will reach its climax in the elections about to be held in more than one hundred cities and towns in Illinois. The town elections will be held tomorrow and the city elections one week later. Reports from all over the state indicate intense interest in the struggle. Among the larger places which will vote on the "wet" and "dry" question are Monmouth, Freeport, Rockford, Waukegan, Mattoon, Belvidere, Champaign, Centralia and Dixon.

Alabama Booms Underwood

MONTGOMERY, Ala., April 2.—At a state-wide primary in Alabama today the democratic voters selected candidates for congress and named delegates to the state convention which is to assemble two weeks hence to nominate candidates for the state offices to be filled at the coming election. In the primaries the voters also were given an opportunity to express their preference for the presidential nomination, but the delegates to the Baltimore gathering will be selected by the state convention.
