

REBECCA BRIGHT PLEASING PLAY

"Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm" proved to be a bright and wholesome play. A sweet little pastoral poem, a dainty picture of rural life.

The book by Kate Douglas Wiggin possesses the charm that made "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch" famous, namely a simplicity and home-like atmosphere.

The cast of last night's play was in most respects a very good one. Miss St. George as Rebecca was very good indeed. It is difficult for even so young a lady as Miss St. George to impersonate both child and young lady and to appear perfectly consistent at all times, but Miss St. George gave us a modest and life-like picture of the little Miss in transit from short skirts to the graduating dress of fuller length. Maud Ream Stoyer was very good indeed as the ebullient but good hearted Marinda Sawyer as was also Miss Loyola O'Conner. These ladies deserve credit for the artistic manner in which they played their parts.

Sam Reed as the village stage driver overdid his part a little at times. Mr. Reed was not content with a modest characterization of the rural good hearted Uncle Jeremiah. He could not resist adding a little, which marred his performance. "Let your clowns say no more than is set down for them." Mr. Alfred Hudson is a splendid actor. He did his part in a most satisfying manner. His love scene with Rebecca was very dainty, never jarring upon the sense of one's propriety. The rest of the cast was all very good and the performance as a whole was among the real enjoyable entertainments of the season.

CLUB ENDORSES MILITIA MOVE

The question of organizing a company of the Oregon state militia at Medford was introduced at Thursday night's session of the Commercial club by Dr. Deane, who stated that a petition to the governor should be prepared, and that it was more than probable that Medford could secure this military organization by a little effort. Dr. Deane also stated that the last session of the legislature appropriated \$30,000 for the building of an Armory at Ashland; that such an appropriation could not have been made but that it was the headquarters of one company of the Oregon militia, and that if Medford had one company organized it would be necessary for the legislature to establish an armory here; also that otherwise such an organization is desirable from the fact that it would be of financial benefit to the city, as well as educational for the young men who form the military company. The president of the club was directed to prepare a petition asking the governor to select Medford as the headquarters for one company of the Oregon militia, and that such officers have full power to organize said company.

HILLMAN TO BEGIN SERVING TERM SOON

SEATTLE, Wash., April 5.—Clarence D. Hillman, the convicted millionaire real estate man, will not begin his term of two years and a half at McNeil's Island on the federal charge of using the mails for fraudulent purposes, until some time next week. The writ of mandamus from the circuit court, which was expected here either today or tomorrow, has been delayed, according to advices received by District Attorney Todd from the department of justice at Washington, D. C., and will not arrive until next week.
