SALAZAR ENTERS CITY OF PARRAL

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, April 5.—General Salazar and his rebel troops have driven the federals under General Villa from Parral and are now in complete possession of the town, according to dispatches received here this afternoon.

Except to say that the federals evacuated the town last night, no details were contained in the messages.

Both officials are charged with gross incompetency, and abuse of public office, and an immediate hearing is demanded.

ILLINOIS CENTER POLITICAL FIGHT

CHICAGO, April 5.—With Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey beginning today a two days' tour of Illinois in the interest of his candidacy for the democratic presidential nomination; with Colonel Theodore Roosevelt expected here tomorrow and with representatives of three other presidential aspirants actively at work, Illinois is in the center of a spirited primary campaign.

Governor Wilson expects to duplicate the result of the Wisconsin primary when he carries that state. The way through Illinois was paved for him by Senator Gore of Oklahoma. Wilson spoke this morning at Joliet, Pontiac, Bloomington, and Lincoln. This afternoon he spoke at Springfield and tonight at Peoria. The governor declared that he has been busy in New Jersey, "catching up" with his work by investigating 113 bills passed by the state legislature.

CLOSING IN ON ALLEN BANDITS

MOUNT AIRY, N. C., April 5.—Detectives this afternoon are closing in on Sidna Allen and Wesley Edwards, his nephew, the only free members of the Allen bandit clan, according to dispatches received here. The outlaws, it is said, have been tracked to Wards Gap, about 12 miles from here. Fresh bloodhounds have been placed on the trail, and the detectives expect soon to have the bandits in custody.
