OFF TO BLUE LEDGE MONDAY

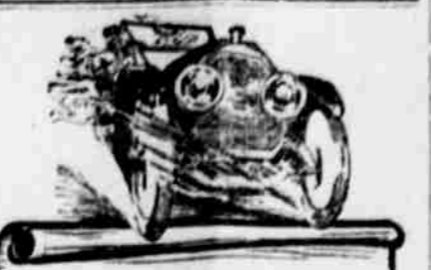
