

## DE LA BARRA IS IDOL OF MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, April 8.—That former Provisional President De La Barra is the idol of all Mexicans was shown here today when he arrived from Vera Cruz on his return from Europe. No statesman ever received a greater ovation than that extended to De La Barra, his demonstration exceeding in enthusiasm that which was accorded President Madero on his arrival here following his victorious campaign against Porfirio Diaz. More than 10,000 persons greeted De La Barra at the station here, after which he was escorted through the principal streets of the capital, every thoroughfare being jammed with humanity.

La Prensa published today what purports to be an American plan for the invasion of Mexico. The article has served to increase anti-American sentiment here. Twenty thousand cartridges were distributed among the police this afternoon to be used in case of riots.

## CIRCUS SEASON SOON TO OPEN

Advance Agent Wm. K. Peck was in town Saturday to make arrangements for the Al. G. Barnes wild animal show, to give two performances here on Monday, April 22. In a few days the publicity car will arrive and further advertise this peerless attraction. ## AMERICANS GUARD EL PASO BRIDGE

EL PASO, Texas, April 8.—With orders to shoot down any prowler who disregarded their challenges, a detachment of American troops all last night guarded the international bridge between Juarez and El Paso, following two attempts a dynamite structure. Despite their vigilance two charges were later exploded on the Mexican side, slightly damaging the bridge. Immediately thereafter the soldiers heard cries of "Viva Madero," leading them to believe that the dynamiting was the work of federal troops or Madero sympathizers. The tracks of the Mexico North Western railroad are laid over the bridge.

Immediately after the explosion the Juarez authorities refused to allow any El Paso street cars to enter the Mexican City. Juarez is in a state of suppressed excitement today, many residents believing that the federals are planning to retake the city from the rebels.

## NEW RURAL ROUTE TO BE ESTABLISHED

Prospects for the establishment of the rural route while in all probability be called No. 2, are brighter than they have been for some time. A petition with some 150 names has been handed in to Postmaster Woodford and forwarded to the proper officials.

The route will cover a great deal of territory. Leaving this city, it will travel north past the Hillcrest orchards and then west to the Medford and Eagle Point road, covering practically all of the land owned by the Roguelands company. From this road the return to Medford will be accomplished by the way of Bear creek.

In all the road will be some twenty-eight miles in length and the number of patrons will be over 200.
