TEDDY JOYOUS OVER WELCOME

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., April 11.— Jubilant over the reception accorded him by monster crowds during his speechmaking tour of Pennsylvania, Colonel Theodore Roosevelt left here today intending to speak at every city and town between here and New York City.

New records for political crowds were established at Lancaster, Harrisburg and Philadelphia. It is estimated that 75,000 persons heard Colonel Roosevelt's address. The crowds at other points turned out in corresponding numbers, and the Roosevelt campaign managers are predicting that the former president will carry the state by an overwhelming majority.

Next Friday Colonel Roosevelt plans to leave New York for a brief tour of Massachusetts and New Hampshire. Addresses will be made at a number of the principal cities, and with his New England tour complete Roosevelt will try to arrange his affairs so as to start Tuesday on his campaign of Nebraska.

THOUSANDS DIE IN PANAMA ERUPTION

MOBILE, Ala., April 11.—Thousands of persons have been killed and the country for miles about the peak of Chiriqui, near Coco Del Toro, Panama, buried beneath millions of tons of lava as a result of an eruption of the peak April 5, according to reports brought here by Captain Olsvik of the steamer Fort Morgan, who witnessed the spectacle from a nearby port. Many Indian villages were completely buried, and the total death toll will be never known, but Captain Olsvik estimates that it will be no less than 2,500.

Shortly after the eruption, which lasted but a few minutes, the Fort Morgan, 14 miles away, was caught in a violent current and almost torn loose from her moorings.

BRUTAL SLAVERY BY STEEL TRUST

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 11.—In a report submitted today by the senate committee on labor and education, labor conditions in the plants controlled by the United States Steel corporation were denounced as "a brutal system of industrial slavery."

The report was made in connection with the proposed eight hour law for government contract labor.

CONTEST PROMISED KENTUCKY DELEGATION

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 11.—At a conference held here at noon the Roosevelt delegates to the Kentucky state convention decided to contest the seating of a delegation from Kentucky instructed for President Taft when the national convention meets in Chicago. There are about 1000 contests, involving a third of the seats in the convention.

The Roosevelt delegates decided that they will not bolt the convention here, but will contest the delegation on the ground of fraud.

ATTACH PROPERTY AT AMENT DAM

GRANTS PASS, Ore., April 11.—The sheriff's office in this city has attached about 2200 acres of land on the south side of Rogue river, near Grants Pass, belonging to C. M. Leonard of the Leonard Construction company, Chicago and Portland; P. P. Phillip, banker, Chicago and Rochester B. Slaughter of the baking firm of O. A. Slaughter and Co., of Chicago, in the suit filed by George W. Sorenson, receiver of the Chicago Rogue River Irrigation company, against Leonard, Phillip and Slaughter on an alleged contract whereof it is claimed that Leonard agreed to furnish the Chicago Rogue River company \$75,000 to carry on ditch extension work and care for outstanding obligations and who afterwards took Phillip and Slaughter in with him on the deal.

The land attached is acreage purchased from local owners for the Chicago men. With irrigation the land is valued at about \$200,000.

REBELS EXECUTE AMERICAN OFFICER

MEXICO CITY, April 11.—Official confirmation was given here today of the execution by the rebels of Thomas Fountain, an American officer in General Villa's army.

Fountain was captured a week ago and condemned to die, but was finally granted the "law of flight" permitting liberty within certain bounds. Persons thus liberated are always shot, however, it being reported that they were shot while "in flight."

Four bullets were found in Fountain's back.

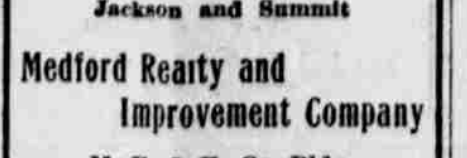

PLANTING 10,000 FOREST TREES

The local forest office has received 10,000 yellow pine slips from Wind River, Washington, which are now being planted in the Cat Hill district of the Crater National Forest. The slips are two years old and average about four inches in length.

The trees are being planted about eight feet apart on burned over area. Last year a large amount of reseeding was done which is proving a splendid success.
