ENGINEERS PLAN RAILROAD STRIKE

NEW YORK, April 12.—A vigorous strike of railroad engineers, affecting all lines east of Chicago and north of the Ohio river, is threatened here today unless the officials grant demands for increased wages. Word to this effect was today sent to J. C. Stuart, chairman of the railroad committee, by Warren Stone, grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

The counting of the ballots was concluded today, the vote showing that 94.15 per cent of the engineers favored authorizing the general officers of the brotherhood to order a strike whenever they deemed it necessary. The demands of the engineers, according to the ultimatum sent to Stuart, must be met by April 15.

SWORE AT HELLO GIRL IT COST HIM \$100

PORTLAND, Ore., April 12.—For swearing over the telephone at girl operators, Edward Murphy, a bartender, today has been sentenced to serve six months in jail and pay a fine of \$100. This is the first conviction under the new statute making the public use of profane or indecent language a crime. Murphy took an appeal.

It is believed that other prosecutions for using profane language over the telephone will follow.
