### THE BLUE LEDGE RAILROAD

There was a time when Medford and Central Point swung about even in the balance of commercial importance. With Central Point perhaps a little in the lead on account of the annual fair held at that place. The relative positions in the valley are about equal, both being in the center of the farming district of the Rogue River valley. Medford, however, by some chance, promoted the railroad to Jacksonville. From that day, began Medford's supremacy. Had the road been built from Central Point, there is no question but what that town would have been the Medford of the Rogue River valley.

Let us suppose for a minute that Grants Pass with her present hustle and strenuous effort were to succeed in getting a road up the Applegate valley to the Blue Ledge, and not only bring all the tonnage and business to the Southern Pacific from that point, but capture the trade of the Applegate district. Would Medford consider she had lost anything? Think this over.

Is there any likelihood of the Southern Pacific building from Grants Pass? Let us see. It would bring tonnage to their road that would not have to be divided with the Hill line. It would control the situation from this valley to the coast. It would monopolize the only available pass. They could tap the red woods down toward Crescent City and bring down the tonnage of the Blue Ledge without going to the coast and entering their long haul in two, which they now enjoy between San Francisco and Portland.

Let us not take too long a chance. Don't be hypnotized by Rosie's scold that won't come off. You know Hamlet says, "A man smile and smile and be a villain."
