OCEAN LINERS DO NOT CARRY ENOUGH LIFEBOATS

WASHINGTON, April 16.—That ocean liners of great size do not carry sufficient lifeboats to care for the passengers in the event of disaster was the statement made here this afternoon by Supervising Inspector Ohler of the steamboat inspection service.

"After vessels reach a certain size," he said, "they are equipped with lifeboats according to tonnage and not according to the number of passengers. As a rule the great liners are not equipped with enough lifeboats to save the passengers, though they usually have sufficient life preservers."

MICHIGAN WILL SUPPORT WILSON

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 16.—Nine counties in Michigan have elected 247 Wilson delegates to the state convention according to advices received at the Woodrow Wilson headquarters in Washington today.

The Wilson men have had to contend with powerful opposition by the machine politicians but so far the allies have not succeeded in electing a single delegate against Wilson, though 31 are unopposed. The Wilson managers are delighted with the showing to date and are confident that the Michigan convention will elect a Wilson delegation to the Baltimore convention.

The sentiment of South Carolina delegates is unquestionably in favor of the nomination of Woodrow Wilson for the presidency, according to Senator Ben B. Tillman, who returned to Washington today.

MRS. CANON RECOVERING FROM PAINFUL ACCIDENT

NEW YORK, April 16.—Flat denial of the report that J. P. Morgan, the New York financier, was aboard the lost Titanic, was made at his offices here today. It was announced that Morgan is at Aix-les-Bains, France.

Hickory Nut Cake

(Recipe by Mrs. Sara Tyson Ross) Four ounces Cottole; two cups flour; four eggs white; one and one-half cups sugar; three-quarters cup water; one cup hickory nut kernels; one teaspoonful baking powder.

Beat Cottole and sugar to a cream, add water and flour, stir until smooth; add half the well beaten whites; then the nuts; then the remainder of the whites and the baking powder. Pour into square flat pans, lined with greased paper to the depth of three inches and bake in moderate oven forty-five minutes.

ROUT OF MR. TAFT ALMOST COMPLETE

ROOSEVELT DELEGATES QUITE OUTNUMBER OTHER CANDIDATES.

"Teddy" Wins Sweeping Victory in Illinois and Maine—Taft Has But 44 Delegates; T. R. Has 142 Already.

- Convention Delegates. Following are the delegates to the Republican National Convention already pledged to each of the various candidates: Four hundred and sixty-eight delegates have been elected. For Colonel Roosevelt, 142; W. H. Taft, 44; Senator Cummins, 4; Robert La Follette, 36; Uninstructed, 91; Contests pending, 138.

PORTLAND—Any impartial analysis of the returns on delegates to the Republican National Convention shows that the rout of Taft has begun. After the great Roosevelt victory in Illinois, in which the people really had an opportunity to express themselves, no reasonable person can doubt that the ultimate end is the nomination of Colonel Roosevelt for President.

So completely was Taft defeated in Illinois that he received but two delegates to Roosevelt's 56—the state district that Mr. Taft carried being Senator Lorimer's.

A thorough Roosevelt victory in Oregon is thus assured by all.

Taft Rout is Complete. Senator Fred W. Mulkey, of Portland, Oregon, Roosevelt committee man, has received the following telegram from Joseph M. Dixon, of Washington, D. C., the Roosevelt campaign manager:

"Four hundred and sixty-eight delegates to the Republican National Convention have been elected up to and including today. Of these, 142 are for Colonel Roosevelt, 44 for Mr. Taft, 4 for Senator Cummins, 36 for Senator La Follette, 91 uninstructed, including 84 from New York State, and contests are pending in cases of the remaining 138.

"The Taft rout has begun. Following the great Roosevelt victory in Illinois, comes the report of the Roosevelt victory in Maine. The action of the Maine Republican state and district conventions in pledging by a vote of two to one, their entire delegation of 12 delegates to the Chicago convention for Roosevelt shows conclusively that the New England Republicans are keeping step with Illinois and the other Republican States of the Mississippi Valley in the Roosevelt column.

New England for T. R. "The Taft managers have been loudly proclaiming that New England was solid for Taft.

"The result in Maine makes their claim ridiculous.

"In Vermont, Roosevelt takes one-half of the instructed delegates and the state convention by mutual agreement selects two Roosevelt and two Taft delegates and sends all of them to Chicago uninstructed. Final returns show that Roosevelt carried Illinois by about 150,000 majority.

"It was a landslide which swept everything before it, except one district, the Fifth, which is Lorimer's.

Taft Loses Own Districts. "The Illinois delegation to the National Convention will be: Roosevelt 56, Taft 2. The districts of ex-Speaker Cannon and McKinley, the manager of the Taft propaganda, endorsed Roosevelt overwhelmingly, McKinley losing his own precinct by a two to one vote after having personally devoted some time to it. The entire country should not overlook the significance of Roosevelt's carrying the ninth congressional district of Illinois by a vote of over two to one. In which five two of Taft's cabinet officers, McVeagh of the Treasury of War Dickinson, Assistant Treasurer of the National Committee Upland, ex-Mayor Busse of Chicago, former Secretary to President Taft, Morton; Assistant Secretary of Commerce and Labor, Nagle; and Taylor, McVeagh's private secretary, all of whom were for Taft."
