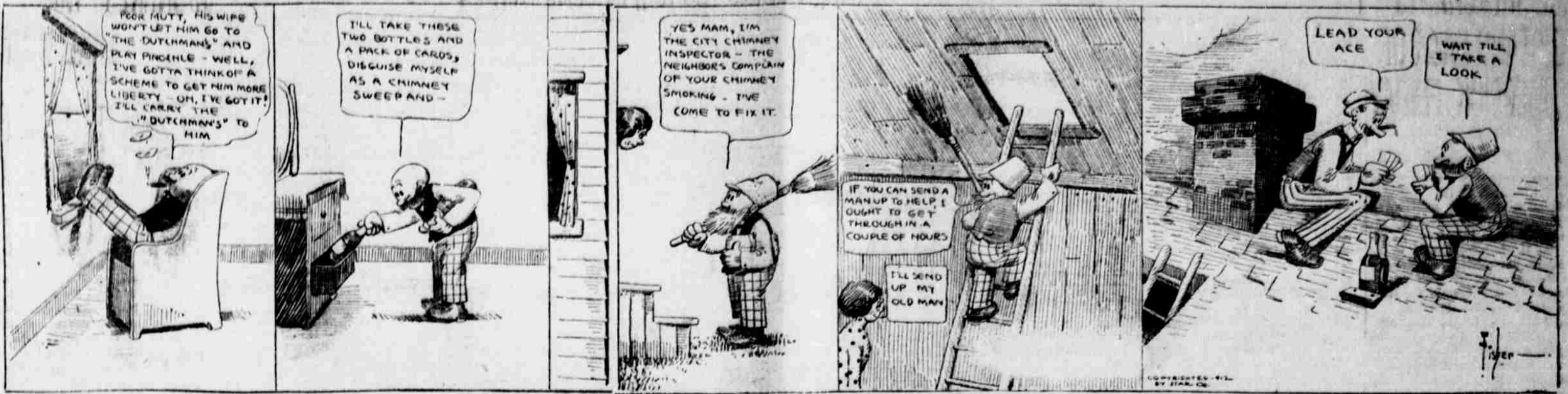


# At Times Jeff Really Shows Flashes of Human Intelligence

## WOMAN WHO ELOPED WITH PASTOR HAPPY

NEW YORK, April 14.—"The happiest woman in the world," according to her own account, is Floretta Whaley, who for five years has shared the cares and labors of Jere Cook, who left his wife and his ministry of St. George's Episcopal church, Hempstead, to elope with his attractive parishioner. With her two sturdy sons, born to her and Cooke, she appeared today as conventional a woman and mother as could be found.

"We have lived together five years of the deepest happiness that could be known in the world," said the "unmarried wife" today. "We adore each other. I feel that in this exceptional case we have proved that we did right when we went away together. Yet I would be the first one to prevent any other young girl from doing what I did. Marriage, even the ceremonial marriage, is a great safeguard to society. There is only one man in a million that would have clung to me as my husband did. For the other woman has need for all the advantages the law confers on a married woman. The man should support her, should cherish her, but he does not in many cases if she goes with him without the ceremony of marriage. He seems to despise her. Then there are the children. For the poor, helpless children the safeguards of society are absolutely needed."

"My husband put it on my finger when he went away. I did not ask for it, but when he gave it to me I felt the greatest delight. The spirit of that wedding ring and of that act has been about our whole life together, and I only long for the day when he will be free and able to put the ring there in the ceremony of the church."

She told of her experiences in fighting poverty with Cooke in San Francisco and of his efforts to "make good." Cooke is now working at the paper-hanging trade in New York.

## NEEDN'T KILL CHICKENS TO GUARANTEE TRUTH

PORTLAND, Or., April 16.—Plans for the administration of the Chinese oath to witnesses in the trial of Wong Si Sam, a Chinese, charged with the murder of Seld Bing, a fellow countryman, which began here today, were shattered when Judge Henry McGinn refused to allow such proceedings.

"I will not allow this courtroom to be turned into a slaughter house," said Judge McGinn, when it was proposed that a chicken should be decapitated each time a Chinese was sworn in as a witness so that he would be certain to tell the truth. "If a witness can't tell the truth without having a chicken killed he is not much good."

Judge McGinn finally decided to allow the "saucer" and "lighted candle" tests. These are regarded as almost as good as the chicken beheading proceeding.

Si Sam, with Lew Soon, is alleged to have killed Seld Bing, whose quartered body was found last December in Seattle, where it had been shipped from Portland.

The principal witness for the state will be Oi Sen, a Chinese woman, who, police say, confessed complicity in the crime.

Lew Soon's trial will follow Sam's.

## AMERICANS ARE FLEEING MEXICO

EL PASO, Texas, April 16.—All Americans and most of the other foreign residents are leaving Chihuahua today following the American government's ultimatum to President Francisco I. Madero and General Pascual Orozco that the lives and property of American citizens must be protected. Fifty Americans arrived here today, 40 others having reached here last night. They report that the ultimatum has increased the sentiment against Americans. Rebel soldiers boarded each train and searched every American passenger before the trains were allowed to depart.

## FLIES 130 MILES OVER OCEAN IN 130 MINUTES

LOS ANGELES, April 16.—Flying almost 130 miles over the ocean from San Diego to Los Angeles in a fraction over 130 minutes, Farmm Fish, the youngest licensed aviator in the world, is believed today to have shattered several records.

Fish, who is 17 years old, left North Island, San Diego, late yesterday, presumably for a trial spin. At an altitude of 5,000 feet he suddenly swung out over the ocean, turned northward and quickly disappeared.

Aero club officials here declare Fish's feat, in addition to beating speed records, was the longest continuous inter-city flight ever made on the Pacific coast, and the longest continuous over-ocean flight in the history of aviation.
