CHARITY AIDED BY ATTEMPT TO KILL

ROME, April 17.—The recent attempt on the life of King Victor Emmanuel is bearing most remarkable fruit in Italy in the way of charity. As a token of their gratitude at the king's escape, people from all over Italy are now daily sending large sums to the king and to Queen Helena to be used by them in whatever charitable manner they may choose.

In a way this rather unusual manifestation is a result of the charitable work done in Italy by Queen Helena, who was formerly Princess Helena of Montenegro, and at first was rather coldly received by the Italians. Since then she has endeared herself to the entire nation, not only by her own personal charity work, but by her constant efforts to arouse the rather indifferent women of the Roman aristocracy into active efforts in behalf of the poor.

The thank offerings now being received amount to from a lire to 10,000, which the queen is apportioning out.

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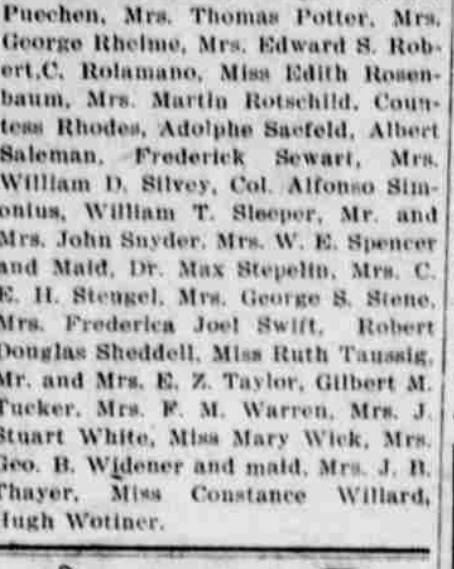
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INCORRECT LIST OF SURVIVORS
