That the consul will not be embarrassed by official espionage; official telegrams and mail will be no longer tampered with nor delayed; the consul has the right of personal conference with Orozco at any time; American citizens are granted the right of immediate appeal to their consul, no matter what the charge against them.

Orozeo said that his previous attitude in refusing to recognize Letcher in his consular capacity was caused by being "misinformed" concerning the consul.
