Administration of "Teddy" Would Be of Common People—Paid Ads Necessary to Tell Truth of Race.

BY F. W. MULKEY. Oregon Roosevelt National Committee. This is a paid newspaper advertisement in the interests of the candidacy of Theodore Roosevelt for the Republican nomination in Oregon for President of the United States.

It is a paid newspaper advertisement because the newspapers for their own reasons decline to print actual news, now that Colonel Roosevelt is a candidate. A few weeks ago nothing was too good for him; now revilement is in order.

In fact, the interests everywhere are afraid of Roosevelt. The reason is, they know Roosevelt will force them into line; they know a Roosevelt administration will be an administration of the common people.

Is Big Business for Taft? Hounded by their advertisers, the newspapers bear the call for Taft. Is Big Business for Taft?

But what the everyday man wants to know is, Has Taft been a good President?

No one doubts that Mr. Taft is a fine citizen, a great lawyer, but— Is he the man we want, Oregon wants, the country wants, for President?

By an overwhelming voice Illinois said no. Illinois, the index to the whole progressive West, declared for Roosevelt.

Yet even in Pennsylvania, where Penrose boasted that he could swing every delegate, the machine bucked.

People Want Roosevelt. For the common people wanted Roosevelt. Having the primary, they made that clear.

With Pennsylvania and Illinois for Roosevelt, with Oregon and the other Western states for him tooth and nail, the great presidential machine in the South, with its machine-elected delegates for Taft, will be smashed.

It is smashed now. Not even the most ardent Taft man admits in his heart that Taft can win the convention.

The people have risen in protest—not against Taft, but what Mr. Taft represents.

Mr. Taft does not think the people are fit to govern themselves; in fact, he thinks they do not even have sense enough to nominate the right men for office.

And that is because Mr. Taft has the "judicial mind"—instead of the mind of the everyday man and the everyday woman.

Sentiment No Guide. There has been some sentiment against a third term for President.

If that is the case, has the United States grown great on sentiment? This country has grown to be what it is because it has at last come to a realization that it knows its own mind and intends to get its own way.

In this case, getting its own way is the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt by the Republican party.

Already, Roosevelt has almost twice as many delegates as Taft. La Follette is a dead letter.

What Will Oregon Do? Therefore, does Oregon want to climb in with the loyal Roosevelt men and women?

I think so. I think, too, that by far the greater number of people in this state know that Roosevelt is square, honest and, above all, is Presidential timber.

So I am convinced that next Friday they will vote for him when they go to the polls.

In this way will Oregon say to Roosevelt: "Keep up the good work—we know you're right."
