

LA FOLLETTE BRIM FULL OF CHEER

Hale and smiling, with a hearty grip and good word for everyone of the crowd that was there to meet him, Senator Robert M. La Follette arrived in Medford Wednesday night, the healthiest invalid the city may hope to see in years.

In an interview Senator La Follette told of his reception in Oregon cities and the confidence that marked his every sentence was not that of the individual but was for the principles he has so long stood for.

Campaign Through Oregon.

Fighting Bob's campaign in Oregon started last Saturday with a speech to 1880 people in Pendleton. Since that time he has spoken in La Grande, The Dalles, Hood River, Portland, Eugene, Albany, Corvallis, Salem, Independence, Amity, Dallas, Dayton, McMinnville, Newburg, and Roseburg.

In Roseburg La Follette upset schedule plans when he refused to be introduced by a standoate citizen, sending word before the speech that some other chairman must preside.

Result in Illinois.

When asked about the Roosevelt victory in Illinois, La Follette replied, "I had no time to campaign as the primary law was passed there but a few days before the primary itself. My friends advised that I leave my name off the ballot as they thought a defeat might hurt my chances in other states, but I knew there would be some who would wish to vote for me in Illinois so I entered the fight— to give them the chance to vote."

Mrs. La Follette was pleased to hear that the ladies of Medford had arranged for her to meet them and when she was told that a ride through the valley was planned she was delighted.

"Medford must be a very progressive city to interest itself so strongly for suffrage," she said. "In most of the places where we visited I found a strong sentiment, but in one or two cities the women didn't seem to want the vote."

At Gold Hill La Follette got off the train to shake hands with a crowd of voters who gave him a lusty cheer as the train pulled out.

ANDERSON FAVORITE FRIDAY NIGHT GO

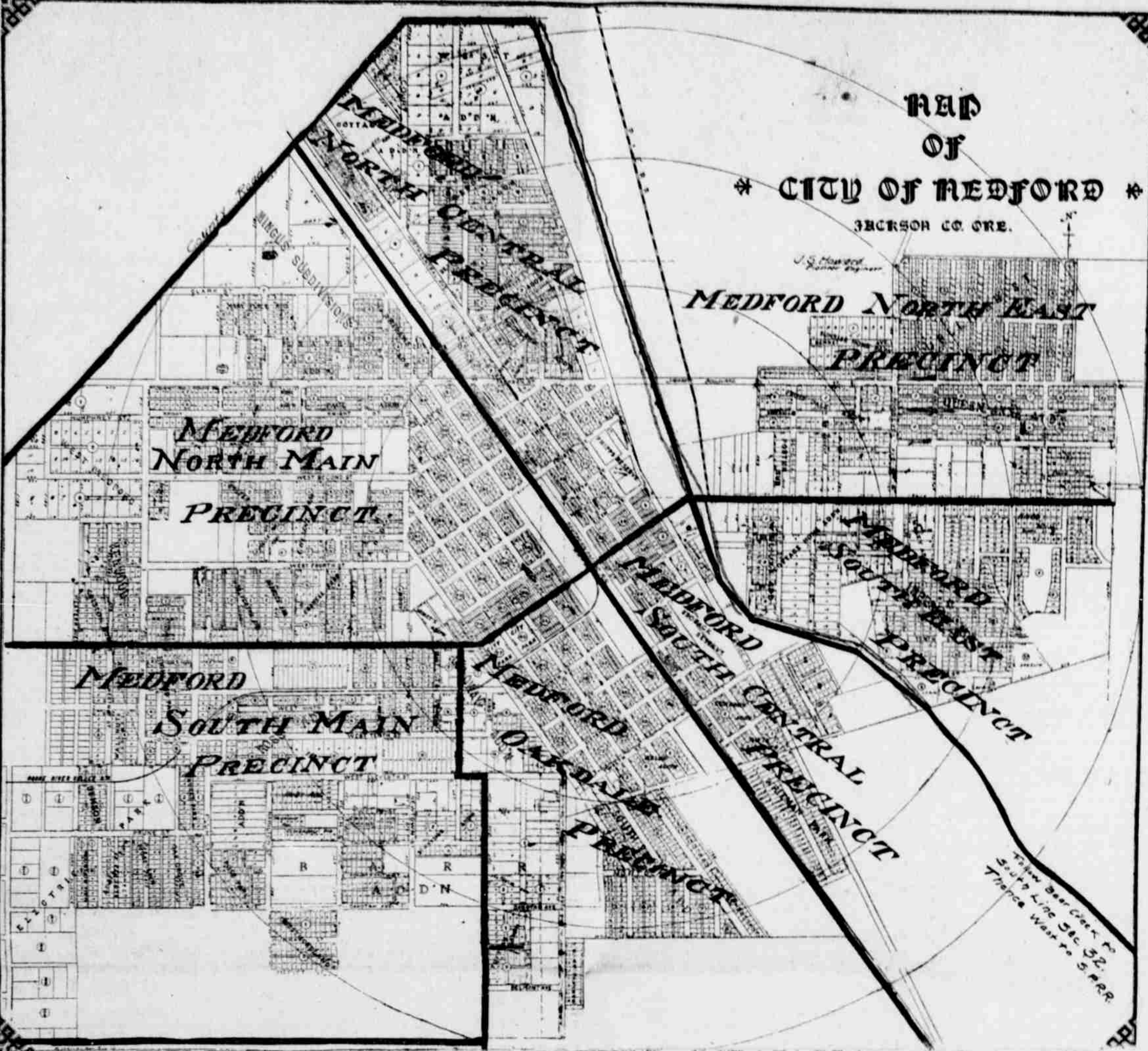
