

NEBRASKA HOLDS FIRST PRIMARY

OMAHA, Neb., April 19.—Light voting characterized the Nebraska preference primary throughout the state today, owing to the fact that the farmers are unable to leave their crops.

The heaviest balloting is expected this evening, the polls remaining open until 9 o'clock to give the farmers an opportunity to vote.

The polling is being retarded considerably by the cumbersome seven-foot ballots which are in use.

Progressives of both the republican and democratic parties are optimistic concerning the outcome.

BREAKBEAM TOURIST LOSES LEFT FOOT

Wm. Christenson, a lumberjack who was stealing a ride on the brakebeam of a car on the Shasta Limited, had his left foot caught under one of the car wheels at Ashland Friday morning, and in dressing the wounded member in Medford Dr. Stearns found it necessary to amputate two toes.

Christenson had ridden the beams on the Shasta Limited over the mountains, and was endeavoring to crawl from under the car at Ashland when his left foot was caught under a car wheel, but the heavy heel and sole of his lumber shoe protected the foot to such an extent that the injury was only slight compared with what it might have been.

After the above experience Christenson pulled himself back onto the brake rods of the moving train and rode to Medford, where he crawled from under the car and was taken care of by a Medford policeman, who summoned a physician and the wound was dressed. Being without means he was taken to the county hospital.

SURVIVORS SIGN LONG STATEMENT

NEW YORK, April 19.—"We, the undersigned, surviving passengers on the Titanic, in order to forestall any sensational or exaggerated statements, deem it our duty to give to the press a statement of facts which have come to our knowledge and which we believe to be true.

"On Sunday, April 14, 1912, at about 11:40 p. m., on a cold, starlight night, in a smooth sea and with no moon, the ship struck an iceberg which had been reported to the bridge by lookouts but not early enough to avoid a collision.

"Steps were taken to ascertain the damage and save the passengers and ship. Orders were given to put on life preservers and boats were lowered. The ship sank about 2:30 a. m. Monday, and usual distress signals were sent out by wireless and rockets at intervals from the ship. Fortunately the wireless message was received by the Cunard's Carpathia at about midnight and she arrived on the scene of the disaster about 4 a. m. Monday.

"Officers and crew of the steamship Carpathia had been preparing all night for the rescue and comfort of the survivors, and the last mentioned were received on board with most touching care and kindness, every care being given, irrespective of class. Passengers, officers and crew gave up their staterooms, clothing and comforts for our benefit. All honor to them.

"The English board of trade passengers' certificate on board the Titanic showed approximately 3500, and the same certificate called for lifeboat accommodations for approximately 550. (Here follows list of boats.)

"The approximate number of passengers carried at the time of the collision follows: First-class, 330; second class, 320; third class, 750; total, 1400; officers and crew, 940. Of the foregoing, the following were rescued by the steamship Carpathia: First-class, 210; second class, 125; third class, 200; officers, 4; seamen, 39; stewards, 96; firemen, 71; total, 216 of crew. The total of about 745 saved was about 80 per cent of the maximum capacity of the lifeboats. We thought it our duty to call attention of the public to what we consider the inadequate supply of life-saving appliances provided for on modern passenger steamships and recommend that immediate steps be taken to compel passenger steamers to carry a sufficient number of boats to accommodate the maximum number of people carried on board.

INCORPORATING NEW RAILROAD

The citizens committee in charge of the plans for securing a railroad from Medford to the Blue Ledge mine are now incorporating a company and will have the matter ready to submit to the people within the next day or two. Work of drawing the incorporation papers is now under way.

NEW MINING CAMP SAID TO BE POOR ONE

GRANTS PASS, Ore., April 19.—The Mining and Scientific Press of San Francisco, date of April 6, warns the mining world against the new gold camp of High Grade, Modoc county, California. An editorial in that technical journal says in part:

"There is good reason to believe that the excitement at High Grade is the artificial product of speculators and promoters who wish to dispose of their holdings, as, on the authority of an engineer who is thoroughly familiar with the district, we are informed that there are only three properties which merit attention—the Sunshine, Consolidated and Big Four. Small and erratic rich streaks of ore occur in Brecciated and the low-grade ores are not developed sufficiently to allow any accuracy of their possibility.

BOYCOTT OF SAN DIEGO FAIR IS PROPOSED

SACRAMENTO, April 19.—Resolutions calling for a national boycott of the San Diego exposition because of the treatment of free speech advocates in that city have been adopted by the socialist party here.

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Out of respect to the memory of the victims of the Titanic disaster, the house of representatives adjourned this afternoon until tomorrow.

HOUQUAM, Wash., April 19.—Declaring that the I. W. W. organization patterned after the big trusts in attempting to weld together all laboring forces, Fred Holmes, an official of the I. W. W. debated with Albert Johnson, editor of the Houquiam Washingtonian, before a crowded house at the Houquiam theatre last night. Johnson denounced the I. W. W. as anarchists, atheists and immoral. He included socialism in the same category. Holmes argued that the I. W. W. doctrines preach peace instead of anarchy.
