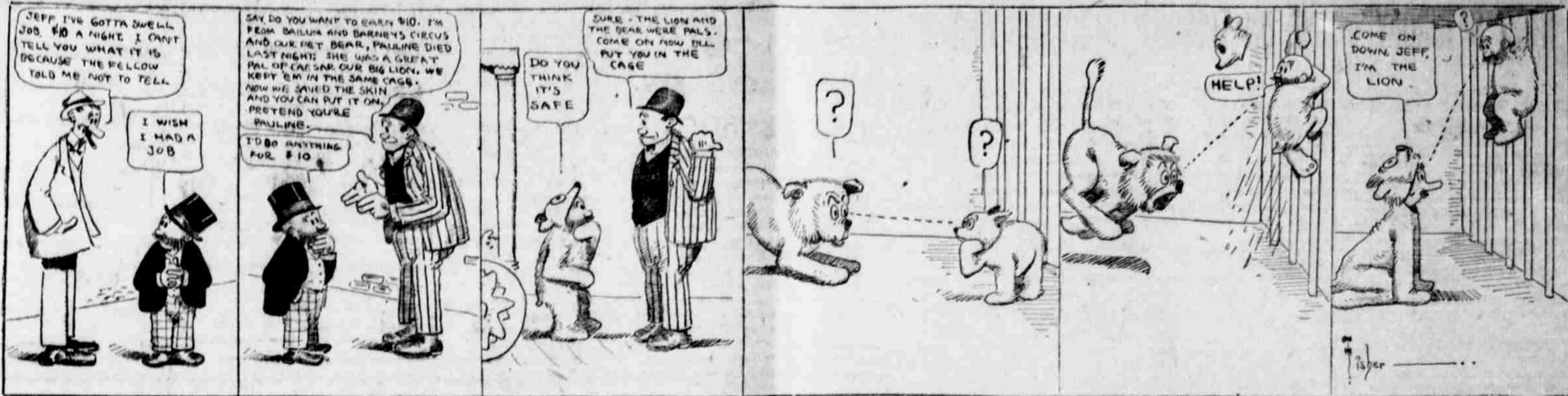


# Jeff Finds That All Is Not Bear That Grows
