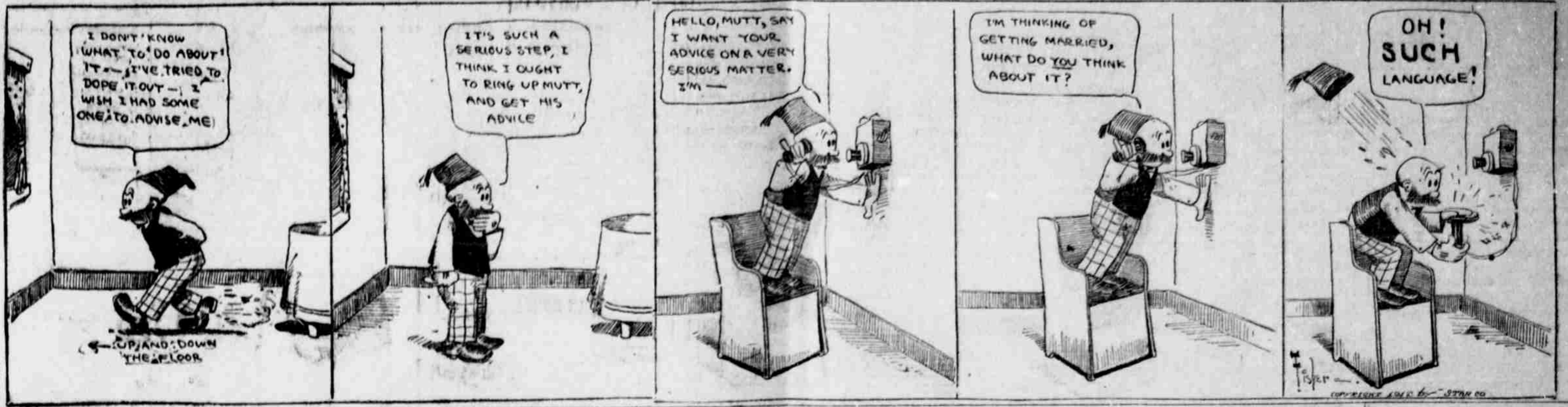


Mutt's Advice Was Evidently Expressive if Not Elegant

COOS PIONEER FOUND MURDERED

MARSHFIELD, Ore., April 20.—Officers today are scouring the country around Coos Bay for the murderer of Jacob Evans, pioneer, who was found dead in his home near here. Mystery shrouds the tragedy. Evans was supposed to be the possessor of knowledge of the hiding place of Mexican treasure of enormous value and is the second person supposed to have been slain by persons looking for the treasure. Evans a few weeks ago figured in the famous Kimmel insurance case as a witness. He testified in the trial in St. Louis that many years ago there was Mexican treasure buried near his home here. It was thought this treasure was the one referred to in the Kimmel case when it was alleged George Kimmel was murdered in Coos county while searching for treasure. Evans was shot four times through the body in the region of the heart.

To Dedicate New Campanile VENICE, April 20.—For the first time in a decade the ears of the Venetians will be gladdened during the coming week by the sound of the famous bells of the Campanile of St. Mark's. Ever since the old Campanile fell in ruins in 1902 the work of rebuilding has been carried on. Today the beautiful tower stands just as before. Every feature has been faithfully reproduced, from the wonderful bronze statues to the famous chimera, for the sound of which ope Plus X has often expressed a yearning since he quit Venice for the vatican. The formal dedication of the new Campanile is set for next Thursday. The municipality has issued an invitation to Italy and the world to attend the ceremonies, which will be conducted on an elaborate scale.
