HAYWOOD INDICTED ON STRIKE CHARGE

LAWRENCE, Mass., April 22.—That William D. Haywood, leader of the Industrial Workers of the World and director and manager of the recent textile strikers in this section, was indicted by the Newburyport grand jury together with several others last week, was announced here today.

Among the others indicted were James Thompson, organizer of the I. W. W. and Edmund Kosini, of the same organization. The three labor leaders were all indicted on charges of conspiracy to intimidate. Haywood was indicted on 22 counts.

Joseph Sciuto was indicted on a charge of murdering Anna Lapizzo on January 29. The woman was shot down on the streets during a labor riot.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—The interstate commerce commission ordered the railroads to restore the southern California fruit growers the right to have loaded fruit cars pre-cooled at a charge of \$7.50 per car.

LETTERS TO ADMINISTER WRECK VICTIM'S ESTATE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 22.—Letters of administration of the estate of Jacob Birnbaum, a San Francisco diamond importer, numbered among those lost in the wreck of the Titanic, were granted by Judge Graham today to public administrator Hynes.

Birnbaum had been buying diamonds in Antwerp and cabled his intention to return on the Titanic. Cabled inquiries following the disaster revealed that he had left as announced. His name failing to appear in the list of survivors, Adolph Koaches, a cousin and member of the importing firm, caused the public administrator to take action regarding the estate.

LEPER WINS STRIKE FOR INCREASE IN PAY

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., April 22.—Upon learning that the other attendants at the United States quarantine station at Diamond Point were getting \$65 while he was given only \$50 per month, John P. Early, the leper who has been chased from one end of the country to the other finally seeking refuge in Tacoma, is today successful after a strike to obtain more wages.

ATLANTA, Ga., April 22.—About twelve persons are reported today killed as a result of a cyclone which yesterday swept Piekeney and other towns of Alabama.

TITANIC CREW MEMBERS DRUNK

CLEVELAND, Ohio, April 22.—Charging that the lookout on the Titanic was asleep when the vessel struck the iceberg which cost more than a thousand lives and that members of the crew were drunk at the time of the wreck from champagne given them by the stewards from the late banquet served to the first cabin passengers, Lewis Klein, a Hungarian, who claims to be a member of the Titanic's crew, was placed under arrest here today. He was detained on a technical charge of mutiny, pending the arrival of a subpoena from the senate investigating committee. The arrest was ordered by Senator William A. Smith, chairman of the committee.

Klein does not speak English and his peculiar story was interpreted by the Austrian vice consul.

ASTOR A HERO ASSERTS WIDOW

NEW YORK, April 22.—Colonel John Jacob Astor, New York millionaire, a victim of the Titanic disaster, went unafraid to his death.

This, in substance, was the tribute paid to the bravery of the wealthy New Yorker by his wife, Mrs. Madeleine Force Astor, who from her sick bed in the Astor mansion here today indignantly denied that Colonel Astor had asked permission to enter the lifeboat in which she escaped.

The last vacant seat in the boat, according to Mrs. Astor, was taken by a man who fought his way through the crowd and leaped into the boat as it was being lowered into the sea. This man, she asserted, snatched all blankets from the shoulders of shivering women and children and sat huddled and cowering in a corner of the boat while frail women roved.

Although Mrs. Astor is still confined to her bed, the Astor family physicians assert her quick recovery is assured.

SALEM WOMAN ARRESTED WITH GANG OF YEGGMEN

SALEM, Ore., April 22.—In the arrest here of a strikingly handsome woman of mysterious identity, A. A. Allison, alias J. W. Polley, alleged former convict, and William Beeman, the police today have, it is believed, effected the capture of a gang of expert safe crackers.

According to the police they found in the possession of one of the trio, Allison, a complete set of safecracking tools. The police claim the three arrested are the perpetrators of several robberies committed in Salem in the last few months.
