

BARNES' CIRCUS HOLDING FORTH AT BALL GROUNDS

It's here, kids.

The Al G. Barnes Big Three Ring Wild Animal Circus arrived in Medford early this morning for two performances today at the ball park. Long before the average small boy was awake the rumble of the heavy red circus wagons could be heard on the street.

As usual a large "reception" committee was at the depot to welcome the show men. As quickly as the cars were parked in the yard of the Southern Pacific the work of unloading began. To the average business man the work of unloading a circus train and the erection of the monster tents is one of the most pleasing incidents on the program of circus day.

Thirty-two Cars.

Altogether it required three separate sections of 32 cars to transport the show. Only the stake and chain wagons, tent wagons and such baggage as necessary to the immediate wants of the encampment was carried on the first section. The No. 2 train arrived 30 minutes later and brought the principal animal trainers and attendants together with the members of the executive staff and the remainder of the baggage wagons. On the third and last section was carried the dens and cages containing the animals. The cars were unloaded as quickly as possible.

The first part of the circus program was the street parade. Headed by four trumpeting military bands the monster pageant of the Al G. Barnes circus left the show grounds shortly after 10 o'clock this morning. All the principal downtown streets were passed through. Glittering in array, sparkling with freshness, radiating in every way the art of the painter and decorator the parade of the Barnes circus this year was the most pleasing ever seen here. Many of the cages containing rare and costly beasts were opened to the public.

Promptly at 1 o'clock the doors to the big show were thrown open. For one hour students of nature had an opportunity of viewing one of the largest collections of wild animals ever assembled beneath one tent. Preceding the performance by 30 minutes a concert of popular and classic selections was rendered by the Al G. Barnes military band of 28 soloists under the direction of Prof. E. E. Markham.

Many New Features.

The performances of the Barnes circus like everything else this year, is all new. Many of the old circus features remain but for the most part the program of two hours is given by wild animals from the jungles under the direction of their keepers and trainers. Without a doubt the most pleasing of the 52 separate feature acts was the group of 24 monster African lions which worked in the massive steel arena under the direction of Captain Richard Ricardo, one of the world's great animal trainers. Other acts deserving especial mention was that of Mme. Florine and her group of Persian leopards, South American panthers and lions; Mme. Ricardo and her troupe of Royal Bengal tigers, and Miss Ethel Bonday and her educated Arabian stallions and wild animals.

Altogether it was a most pleasing and thrilling performance and more than delighted the big crowd which filled the tent. The final performance will be given tonight at 8 o'clock for the benefit of those who could not attend this afternoon. The doors to the big show will be opened at 7 o'clock that the magnificent menagerie may be viewed.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCH DEDICATED; IMPRESSIVE SERVICE

Sunday a large and attentive congregation was present at the dedication services of First Church of Christ, Scientist, on North Oakdale avenue.

The church was effectively decorated with palms, apple blossoms and Easter lilies, making an appropriate setting for the beautiful, impressive service.

The service included the reading of a dedicatory message written some years ago by Mary Baker Eddy, and a brief history of the growth of Christian Science in Medford, which follows:

History of Medford Church.

The first service was held in May, 1906, in the home of one of the members, with six people in attendance.

The steady increase in numbers made it necessary to find larger quarters. The Commercial club room was secured where the services were continued, July, 1906. The members of the Commercial club generously furnished this room free of charge for one year, their brotherly kindness was highly appreciated.

On September 14th, 1908, with nineteen members, we organized as Christian Science Society of Medford, Oregon." At this time it was decided that the collection taken the first Sunday of each month, be set aside for the purchase of a building site.

In Nov., 1908, a lot on North Orange street was purchased which was sold in Sept., 1909, and a payment made on two lots on North Oakdale avenue, the site of this church edifice.

Organizing to Build.

From the fall of 1909 to Jan. 15, 1911, services were held in the more commodious quarters of a hall on North Grape street, where payment on the lots was completed, followed by a business meeting held for the purpose of considering the advisability of erecting a church building.
