WHAT COLORADO PEOPLE DESIRE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 24.—Copies of each of the initiative petitions now being circulated in Colorado under the new direct legislation law passed in that state last winter were received here yesterday. Among these measures for which the people of Colorado are working are:

A constitutional amendment establishing the recall of all elective officers; a recall of decisions of courts declaring laws unconstitutional; the allowing of trial by jury and before another judge to any one charged by a judge with contempt of court not committed in his immediate presence; a mothers' compensation bill, promoted by Judge Ben B. Lindsay of Denver, providing pay for needy mothers to stay at home and take care of their children rather than having the state pay for the children's care in a state institution, and a bill establishing state coal mines, whose product is to be sold direct to consumers as nearly as possible at cost.

Another amendment sought is to create a public utilities court similar to the California state railroad commission. Still another would utilize all school houses after school hours as forums for the people for discussions of public questions.
