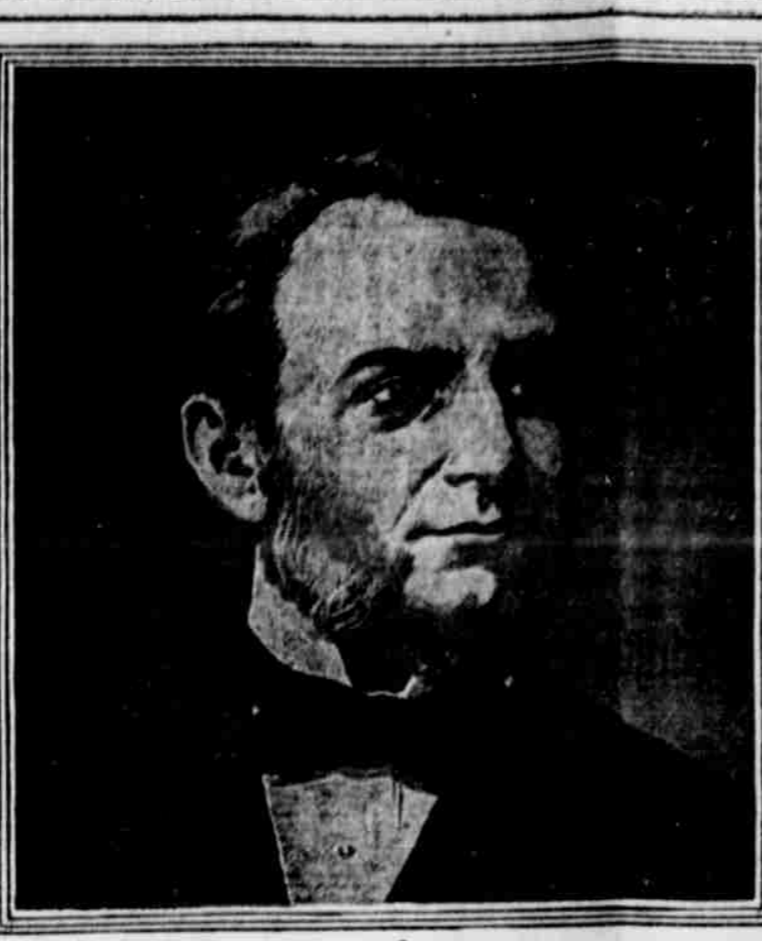

CHICAGO, April 24.—Dr. D. K. Pearson, aged 92 years, philanthropist and former multi-millionaire, who recently gave his last dollar to educational institutions, is dying today at Hinsdale sanitarium of pneumonia. Dr. Pearson is being kept alive by the use of oxygen.

CURRY COUNTY HAS NICE CLEAN OFFICES FOR ITS OFFICIALS

A graphic word picture of conditions which exist in the county offices of Curry county is contained in a letter received by J. W. Wilson of Jacksonville from George W. Smith, county clerk of Curry. Mr. Wilson, janitor and jailer at the Jackson county courthouse, recently decided to remove to Curry county and wrote to Mr. Smith asking in regard to a similar position at Gold Beach. County Clerk Smith replied as follows: "I am in receipt of your letter of the 11th inst. and in reply beg to state that we have neither jailer nor janitor. The sheriff acts as jailer, or sometimes employs extra help, but as we have not had a prisoner since last August, and only on rare occasions that help is needed. "I sweep my own office (about three times a month) and look after my own fires, the sheriff does the same (though I think he is neater than myself—or else it is because he has more spare time—he sweeps almost every week). The treasurer is an old man with a crippled hand so he doesn't bother much about sweeping—I think he swept out his room once since the holidays, and will perhaps repeat the operation once more before the 4th of July."

ROBERTS ARRAIGNED FOR AUTOMOBILE MURDER

PORTLAND, Ore., April 24.—H. E. Roberts was arraigned here today on a charge of murdering Donald Stewart, a member of an automobile party who with George Hastings was shot and killed a few nights ago when the machine in which they were riding near here was not halted at the word of command. Roberts pleaded not guilty. His trial will be set Thursday.
