PROBE ACTIONS OF OTHER STEAMERS

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Determined to probe to the bottom the loss of the Titanic, Senator Smith, chairman of the senate sub-committee probing the disaster, acted today upon information contained in United Press dispatches and subpoenaed the captain and the wireless operator of the steamer Californian.

They will be asked to produce the logbook of the liner and to testify regarding the exact language used in the warning against ice which was sent by wireless to the Titanic on the Sunday night of the disaster.

Chairman Smith also announced that tomorrow the committeemen would each examine several members of the Titanic's crew in separate sessions with a view to expediting the inquiry.

Admission that he received President Taft's message inquiring as to the fate of Major Butt, coupled with the explanation that he did not know it was from the president, was made this afternoon by Wireless Operator Cottam of the Carpathia. Cottam admitted receiving the "four figures" message from Chief Operator Sammis of the Marconi company, but stated that he did not reply to it.

He admitted having sold his story of the rescue of the Titanic's passengers on the night the Carpathia arrived in New York, but he added: "I haven't received anything for it yet."

Cottam declared he had heard the Frankfurt reply to the distress signals of the Titanic, but he said that the German liner did not give her own position. Whether they ignored the call for help he did not know.

From the actions of the Frankfurt's operator, he believed the Titanic's wireless man, Jack Phillips, was justified in calling the Frankfurt operator a fool.

MILWAUKEE IS FINED FOR VIOLATIONS OF LAW

SEATTLE, April 25.—The Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound Railway company must pay fines aggregating \$1,100 for failure to report violations of the federal law regulating the hours of employment. The complaint was filed by the interstate commerce commission, and the fines were imposed by Judge Hanford.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 25.—Senator La Follette will not speak in San Diego May 2, nor will he tour the citrus belt of Southern California, included in his original itinerary, according to an announcement made at La Follette headquarters here.

Messages from Walter Houser, La Follette's campaign manager, state that it will be necessary for the senator to return to San Francisco next Tuesday evening and that the greater part of the Southern California tour must be abandoned.

SEATTLE, April 25.—Dr. Linda Burfield Hazzard, the fasting specialist, who is under sentence of two to twenty years for the manslaughter of a patient, who, the prosecution alleged was starved to death, completed today the thirtieth day of a fast undertaken to prove mistaken the doctors who testified against her. They said fourteen days was the limit of human endurance without food.

BATTLE WITH BANDIT ON ROOF

PORTLAND, April 25.—Crawling like a wounded animal from one hiding place to another, an unidentified man, thought to be an ex-convict, heavily armed and desperate today is being trailed through the dock district of Portland by thirty patrolmen, under the leadership of Captain of Police Keller.

The man was badly wounded today in a revolver battle with Patrolman Bender.

Bender came on the man in the dock district and as he was loitering about in a suspicious manner, started after him, commanding him to halt.

The man climbed upon the roof of a building, Bender in close pursuit. As he gained on him, the fugitive snapped his revolver five times at Bender, the cartridges each time failing to explode.

The two men grappled on the roof of the building and in the fight Bender was beaten on the head with the gun and almost rendered unconscious. His assailant ran and, climbing from the roof, crawled under an adjoining building. Bender had recovered sufficiently to continue the pursuit and fired five times at the fleeing man, the last shot striking him as he crawled under the building.

ITALY ENTHUSED OVER AEROPLANES

ROME, April 25.—With the entire country enthused over the success of military aeroplanes and dirigibles in the war in Tripoli, a national popular subscription has been opened to present to the nation an entire aerial navy.

Although a similar movement is under way in France, where 2,500,000 francs already has been subscribed, the movement in Italy is being organized on a basis that, it is believed, will greatly exceed that of France.

The movement has been formally endorsed by King Victor Emmanuel, Premier Giolitti and Minister of War

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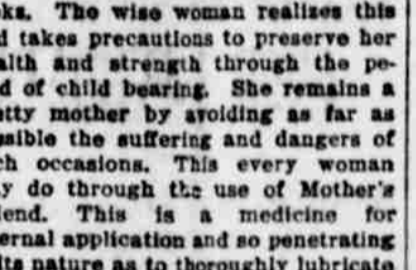
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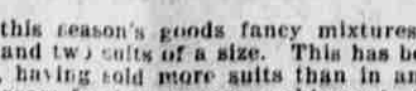
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
