Senator Burton. Both of them, however, thought the vessel was a sailing ship.

Setbacks for the story came, however, in the testimony of Captain Stanley Lord and Wireless Operator Evans of the Californian. Lord declared that Gill's statement of what he saw from the decks of the Californian were absolutely false.

Captain Lord said: "Gill's story is without foundation. None of my officers saw distress rockets while the wireless man slept. I am sure no light was seen from the Californian."

Wireless Operator Evans intimated, however, that the crew of the Californian spoke of having seen the distress signals, though Lord testified that the Californian was beyond the range of vision.
