

BURGLAR CUTS HIS OWN THROAT

SAN JOSE, Cal., April 27.—Captured after a desperate struggle with Charles Titcomb, a coachman, followed by an unsuccessful attempt to commit suicide, when caught red-handed robbing the home of Mrs. S. F. Morrison, here, Charles B. Rey, gentleman burglar and church choir singer, is in the city prison here today.

When the coachman came upon him at his work, Rey beat Titcomb with an iron bar and when the coachman's cries aroused neighbors he slashed his own throat and wrists with a pen-knife, to prevent, as he afterward explained any disgrace falling on his sister, Mrs. E. E. Blodgett, who resides here.

Rey was once prominent in social circles and was head bookkeeper in the Pacific Manufacturing company's Santa Clara offices. He had served a term in San Quentin for burglary and was on a five years' parole. His conduct until a few days ago had been exemplary.

POSTMASTER SHOOTS FLEEING SAFE CRACKER

STOCKTON, Cal., April 27.—E. H. Williamson, postmaster at Farmington was awakened early today by an explosion which all but wrecked the post office building. Grabbing a shotgun, Williamson ran into the street just in time to see a safecracker making his get-away. The postmaster brought the robber down with a charge of bird-shot. The man, who had \$150 of the government funds on his person, was rushed to the emergency hospital. He gave the name of W. A. Hartman. It is announced that he has a chance to recover.

TEDDY MAKES BITTER ATTACK ON TAFT'S MOTIVES

WORCESTER, Mass., April 27.—Merciless denunciation of President Taft was Col. Roosevelt's reply last night to the president's attacks upon him yesterday. Colonel Roosevelt declared that President Taft has given the people of the country a "square deal," but that owing to a "quality of feebleness" he had yielded to the bosses and the great privileged interests.

Roosevelt said that one part of the president's attack upon him was the "crookedest kind of a deal" and "deliberate misrepresentation," and that the president "has not merely in thought, word and deed, been disloyal to our past friendship, but has been disloyal to every canon of ordinary decency and fair dealing such as should obtain even in dealing with a man's bitterest opponents."

He said the president's statement regarding the influence of federal officeholders in the campaign was "not only untrue, but an absurd untruth," and that Taft convinced himself of his insincerity when he signed the Payne-Aldrich tariff bill.

Roosevelt said that in speaking of Roosevelt's position in regard to the trust problem Taft himself is "guilty of a crooked deal."

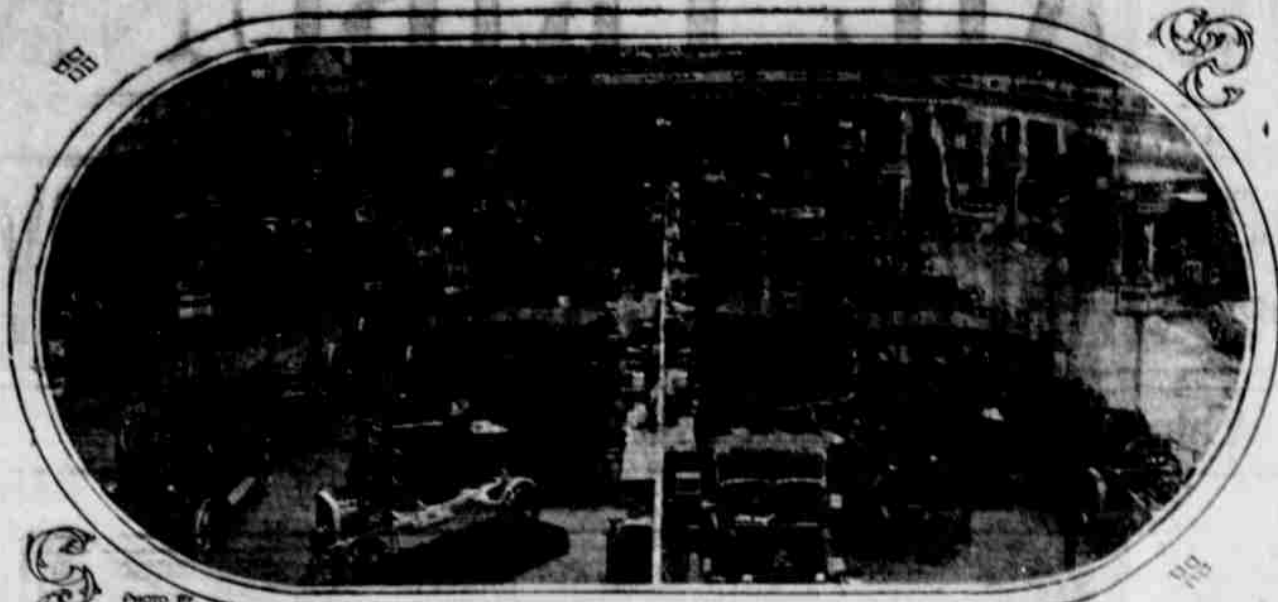
WANT TO PROBE McCABE'S BEEF TRUST CONSPIRACIES

Melvin of the bureau of animal industry, knowingly have permitted the meat packers to defraud the public by nullifying the letter and spirit of the meat inspection law, Congressman Nelson of Wisconsin introduced today a resolution in the house asking for an investigation.

Gomboni, arrested by special officers on a charge of being an agitator in the Metropolitan Brick company's strike. The officers opened fire on the crowd. A private detective was wounded when the mob returned the fire.

FLEET STILL IN SAN DIEGO BAY

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 27.—With the cruiser Maryland lying peacefully at anchor in San Diego harbor and the torpedo flotilla tied up at the Coronado landing, there was little evidence here today of activity on the part of the navy in the Mexican situation, though action was expected any minute.

The Maryland steamed in last night from San Pedro, and two of the torpedo boats immediately left for the south. They returned this morning, however, and rejoined the fleet in the harbor here.

Officers of the navy declare that no orders have been received to proceed south, but it is believed that the warships are ready to sail and that they will leave at a moment's notice, should their presence be required on the west coast of Mexico.

CALIFORNIA MILITIA ORDERED TO BE READY

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 27.—Two companies of the California National Guard, the Fifth and Eighth, received orders from Sacramento today to recruit to 70 men each and be ready for immediate service. It is believed here that service in connection with the Mexican revolution is contemplated.
