### BRYAN STUMPING FOR WOODROW WILSON

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 27.—William J. Bryan, who has been making a series of speeches in Ohio in the interest of the candidacy of Governor Woodrow Wilson, addressing, according to popular estimate, audiences numbering 100,000 people, has taken the stump in Florida in behalf of the candidacy of the New Jersey executive. Mr. Bryan has addressed a mass meeting at Jacksonville yesterday, and today he speaks at Tampa. An engagement has been made for him at Pensacola.

In Florida Governor Wilson is opposed by Representative Oscar Underwood. Both Governor Harmon and Speaker Clark had friends and supporters in the state, but they decided not to run in the primary contest, and when they withdrew the influence of all their supporters was thrown to Mr. Underwood. The fight of the allies in Florida was centered on Mr. Underwood for the reason that a large part of Alabama is contiguous to Florida, and it was thought that he would make the stronger race there. It was agreed that Mr. Underwood could make a better fight than either Governor Harmon or Speaker Clark against Governor Wilson in that state because of the fact that appeal could be made to the neighboring sentimental feeling.

In Florida Governor Wilson's candidacy has a strong supporter in Governor Jennings, who is a nephew of Bryan. Governor Jennings is a very active member of the Florida Woodrow Wilson league, and is a contributor to the campaign fund in that state.

The Puerto Rican sugar commission, composed of eleven men prominent in business and political life of Puerto Rico, and representing the sugar planters of the island who are opposed to the bill now before Congress by which it is proposed to take the duty off sugar, arrived in New York and proceeded immediately to Washington to appear before Congress.
