MAZATLAN'S DICTATOR LEADS REBEL BAND

TUCSON, Ariz., April 29.—That Justo Tirado, former federal dictator of Mazatlan, who was reported to have been assassinated by his followers, is alive and leading a rebel band, was the report reaching here today in messages from Rosario, Chihuahua.

The messages stated that Tirado appeared near Rosario late last Saturday, defeated a detachment of federals and killed a federal captain and several soldiers.

Dispatches today also say that Cullacan has been practically laid waste by looters, and that the rebels are leaving that section.

CHARTER AMENDMENTS. Notice is hereby given that the following is full and correct copy of the Title and Text of those certain Acts of Municipal Legislation Amending the Charter of the City of Medford, Oregon, submitted to the legal voters of said City for their adoption or rejection at a Special Election to be held in and for said City on the 14th day of May, 1912, together with the numbers and form in which the ballot title thereof will be printed on the official ballot.

1. An Act to amend Section 84 and Section 116 of the Charter of the City of Medford.

The people of the City of Medford do ordain as follows: Sec. 84. A sum of money assessed for the improvement of a street shall be collected in the following manner: Notice shall be given to the owner or reputed owner of the property assessed, by name in the lien recorded in the docket of city liens, that said assessment has been made and the lien therefor entered of record in the city lien docket, and that the same is due, and requiring the same to be paid to the City Recorder within ten days from the service of said notice. Said notice shall be served by the City Recorder by publication in some newspaper, by order of the council, for at least one publication thereof, in such manner as the council shall by ordinance prescribe.

Sec. 2. That section 116 of the charter of the City of Medford, Oregon, as amended, be amended so as to read as follows: Sec. 116. Whenever the City Council

shall intend to lay any water main in any street of the City of Medford the cost of which is to be assessed to the property fronting on said street. It shall be the duty of the City Council to assess the proposed main and shall designate the portion of the street along which the same is laid. It shall be the duty of the City Council to assess the cost thereof on the property fronting on said street in proportion to the frontage of said property, and shall lay a time and place at which the same will meet and hear all protests and the assessing of the cost thereof on the property fronting on said street. The resolution shall be published once in a newspaper printed, published and of general circulation in said city, which publication shall be made not less than ten nor more than twenty days before the date of said meeting; and said resolution shall be posted for a period of ten days prior to said meeting in five public and conspicuous places in said city.

The following is the form in which the foregoing measure will appear upon the ballot: Special City Election May 14th, 1912. Mark between number and answer voted for: Submitted by order of the City Council.

Charter amendment vote "yes" or "no." An act to amend Section 84 and Section 116 of the Charter of the City of Medford, providing for the publication of certain ordinances and notices one time instead of three times.

102—Yes. 401—No.

2. An act to amend the charter of the City of Medford giving the City Council of said city power and authority to prohibit and prevent sparring matches, glove contests and prize fights in said city.

The people of the City of Medford do ordain as follows: Sec. 129. The City Council of said city in addition to all of the powers and authority now vested in it shall have power and authority to prohibit and prevent sparring matches, glove contests and prize fights within the limits of said city.

The following is the form in which the foregoing measure will appear upon the ballot: Special City Election May 14th, 1912. Mark between number and answer voted for: Submitted by order of the City Council.

Charter amendment vote "yes" or "no." An act to amend the Charter of the City of Medford, providing for prohibiting sparring matches, glove contests and prize fights in said city.

102—Yes. 402—No.

3. An act to amend the charter of the City of Medford establishing a municipal court in and for said city and repealing sections 131, 132, 133, 134 and 135 of said charter.

The people of the City of Medford do ordain as follows: Sec. 140. There is hereby created in the City of Medford a court to be known as the municipal court. It shall have full and exclusive jurisdiction of all violations of city ordinances with full power to enforce any judgments it may render in the same manner as judgments of justice courts of this state are, or may from time to time be enforced under the laws of this state.

Transcripts of such judgments may be filed in the office of the County Clerk with like effect and in like manner as is provided by law in the case of judgments of such justice courts, and appeals from such judgments may be taken into circuit court of said state for Jackson county in like manner and under the same circumstances as in the case of judgments of such justice courts.

Sec. 141. All proceedings in said court shall be governed and regulated by the laws of the State of Oregon in relation to justice courts, including taxation of costs and disbursements, except that there shall be no trial by jury in said court.

Sec. 142. All fines and costs collected by said court shall be turned over to the City Treasurer by the judge of said court, and said judge shall make a monthly report in writing thereof to the City Council.

Sec. 143. All the powers and functions of said court shall be exercised by a municipal judge. The salary of said judge shall be fixed by the council from time to time and shall be paid by said city in the same manner as the salary of other officers are paid, said salary shall not be changed to take effect during the term of office of said judge. In the absence from the city of said judge the recorder shall perform the duties and functions thereof and shall be ex officio special judge of said court. The judge of said court is as

officer of the City of Medford and shall possess the qualifications elsewhere provided in this charter for officers of said city. Said judge shall be elected by the voters of said city at the annual city election in said city in each odd-numbered year and shall hold office for a term of two years and until his successor is elected and qualified. Before taking office he shall subscribe and file with the recorder of said city an oath that he will honestly and faithfully discharge the duties of said office to the best of his ability. And he

shall furnish a bond for the faithful performance of his duties in such amount as the council shall require to be approved by the council. The council shall have power to appoint a judge of said court to hold office until the annual election in said city in the year 1912.

Sec. 2. Sections 131, 132, 133, 134 and 135 of the charter of the City of Medford are hereby repealed.
