SANTA MONICA, Cal., May 6.—One hundred and seventy-five thousand persons saw a new world's record established in the fourth annual Santa Monica automobile races Saturday by Teddy Tetzlaff of Los Angeles, who, driving a ninety-horsepower Fiat, won the 302-mile free-for-all with the phenomenal record of 78.50 miles per hour, breaking the previous record of 74.63. Caleb Bragg of Pasadena was second and Bruce Brown of New York third.
