FORMER MEDFORDITES TORNADO VICTIMS

Word came to Norman Monday that in the recent tornado that visited the western part of Oklahoma, two well known citizens of this city a short time ago, were unfortunate in the loss of property. Joe Winton and family lived at Sentinel, and his property has been destroyed entirely, while Albert Symcox, who with his family resided on a fine farm adjoining Cordell, the county seat of Washita county, lost all of his buildings when the same storm reached that point.

Both families escaped injury having taken refuge in their storm caves. While the property loss to both men is considerable, they are thankful to have escaped so lightly everything considered. A strange fact to be remembered is that both families were victims of the disastrous tornadoes that visited the sections both north and south of Norman, on the afternoon of April 25th, just nineteen years ago. One tornado experience is usually all that falls to the lot of the average person, and it is to be presumed, that as a rule, that is one more experience than is desirable.
