JAP PAPERS HOOT COMBINE OF POWERS

TOKIO, May 8.—Japanese newspapers generally and a great many prominent Japanese business men and politicians are roasting the Mikado's government for entering into the "six power" syndicate to finance the new Chinese republic.

Japan's share of the loan will be about \$50,000,000. The Japanese are already taxed to the extreme limit of endurance and it will be utterly impossible for the government to raise even a small fraction of \$50,000,000 in the local market.

Count Okuma says the Mikado will have to borrow the money abroad, but this fails to satisfy the opponents of the loan. Though China will have to pay a high rate of interest, Japan is so deeply in debt, it is argued, that its credit is not very good and it will have to pay a high rate, too. Many Japanese doubt if their country will get out even on the transaction and if it fails to do so it will be a very serious matter, because the people are already carrying a burden almost heavier than they can bear.

Count Okuma openly says that the loan means the "six powers" intend to "subjugate the new Chinese republic with money," and that Japan simply had to join the group to protect its own interests.
