TAFT GUEST OF PRINCETON TODAY

PRINCETON, N. J., May 11.—President Taft and Chief Justice White of the United States supreme court were the guests of honor today at the inauguration of John Grier Hibbin as president of Princeton university.

In the presence of several presidents of universities and colleges and of hundreds of members of the Princeton alumni association, Justice Mahlon D. Pitney of the United States supreme court administered the oath of office to the new official on the steps of Nassau Hall. The ceremonies were followed by President Hibbin's inaugural address on "Essentials of a liberal education."

President Taft and Chief Justice White received honorary degrees of L.L.D. from the university.

BURGLARS ATTEMPT TO FOOL OFFICERS

WHAT 100 HENS WILL DO FOR THEIR OWNER

D. M. Lowe of the Ashland View orchards three miles north of town submitted a report to the Commercial club Monday night that should be very encouraging to local poultry raisers, says the Ashland Record. He has kept a record for the past four months of 100 hens of the Plymouth Rock and Minorca breeds as follows: January—99 doz. at 35c. . . . \$34.50
February—145 doz. at 35c. . . . 43.50
March—164 doz. at 29c. . . . 32.80
April—163 doz. at 29c. . . . 32.69

Total \$140.49
The expense for feed and care was \$67.20, leaving a net profit of \$73.29 on the hundred hens for four months. Poultry experts of Petaluma claim one dollar profit for each fowl per year, so it will be seen that Mr. Lowe has beaten that record. He also reports that he has 100 hens, Minorcas exclusively under test and that they are averaging over 100 eggs each fowl, thus far this year.

ISMAY ARRIVES ENGLISH HOME

LIVERPOOL, May 11.—Arriving on the liner Adriatic today, J. Bruce Ismay, managing director of the White Star Line, owners of the wrecked Titanic, was given an ovation here. As he left the dock where scores of friends had gathered to greet him, hearty cheers went up.

Ismay shook hands with a number of those gathered about. He declared that the United States senate committee, under Chairman Smith, which investigated the Titanic wreck and before which Ismay was one of the chief witnesses, had treated him well.

Ismay characterized as unfair the American newspapers, by which he was made the target of criticism for escaping in the Titanic's lifeboats with the women and children instead of going down with the lost vessel.

ALIENISTS EXAMINING RICHESON FOR SANITY

BOSTON, Mass., May 11.—Four celebrated alienists are today examining Rev. C. V. T. Richeson, in jail here for the murder of his sweet heart, Avis Linnell, in an attempt to determine his mental condition. They are Dr. Lloyd Briggs, Morton Prince, Henry Steadman and E. O. Leonard.

If a majority of the alienists declare the condemned man insane, Governor Foss will submit a petition to the state executive council for a commutation of Richeson's sentence. The fallen pastor is under sentence to die May 19.

ANTI-SUFFRAGIST SPEAKS HERE WEDNESDAY NIGHT

BOURNE WILL SUE OREGONIAN FOR LIBEL

PORTLAND, May 11.—In a telegram to District Attorney Cameron of Multnomah county, published here today, Senator Jonathan Bourne, Jr., of Oregon demands that the Portland Oregonian be prosecuted for alleged libelous articles printed in regard to Senator Bourne's campaign expenses.

Senator Bourne asserts that May 2 the Oregonian printed a dispatch from Salem, Ore., stating that Senator Bourne had expended in his campaign for the republican nomination for United States senator \$1996. The corrupt practices act prohibits the use of more than \$1125 by a candidate for a United States senatorship. Senator Bourne contends that in publishing this dispatch the Oregonian falsely charges him with a crime.
