ROOSEVELT CLAIMS NOMINATION ON FIRST BALLOT

DAYTON, Ohio, May 16.—In the opinion of Colonel Roosevelt the campaign for the republican nomination for president has now been settled. In a statement issued last night he said that without counting the contested delegates he had more than 500 already, and it takes 539 to nominate. He expressed the confidence he will be nominated on the first ballot.
 In one speech today he asserted that of the uncontested delegates elected "we have a majority over Taft. On the present showing it will be impossible to nominate him except by unfairly and improperly seating the delegates who have no possible claim to sit in the convention."

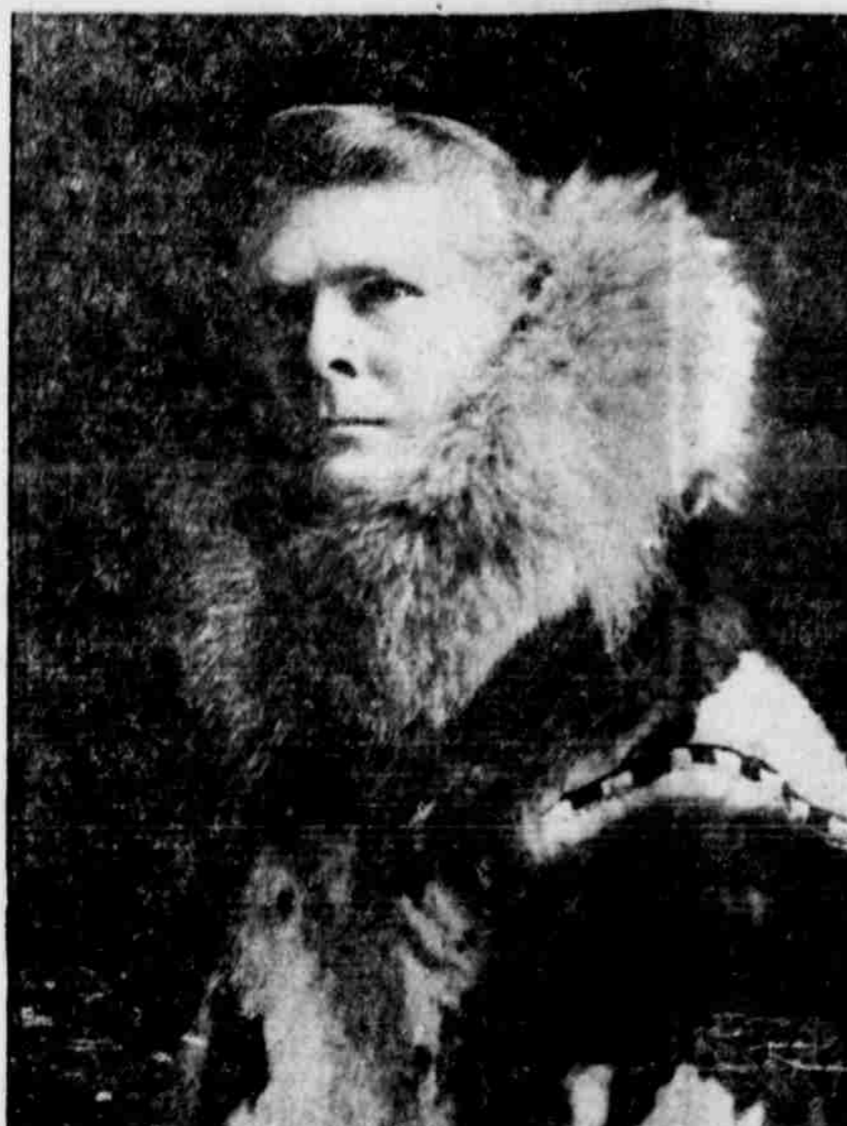

STOCKHOLDERS GET 25C FOR EACH \$1

Judge F. M. Calkins of the circuit court has handed down an order in the case of Edgar Hafer vs. the Medford and Crater Lake Railroad entering a final decree and authorizing the receiver to make a final settlement among the stockholders.

Dr. J. F. Reddy, receiver of the road will proceed with the distribution of the money as soon as possible. He says that about 25 cents on the dollar will be returned to the stockholders, most of them being residents of this city.

RIVAL G. O. P. CONVENTIONS AT ABERDEEN FOR TAFT AND T. R.

ABERDEEN, Wash., May 16.—Rival Roosevelt and Taft delegations will contest at Chicago for the fourteen seats of the state of Washington in the national republican convention. Two entirely separate state conventions that met in separate halls elected separate delegates and adopted separate platforms were held today.

The platform adopted by the Taft convention was largely an eulogy of President Taft and his administration. It denounced the recall of judges, demands the opening of Alaska to private acquisition and the withdrawal of unwarranted executive orders which have blighted that territory.

The Roosevelt platform favors the presidential primary law. Initiative and referendum, recall of elective officers, including the judges, commend conservation of national resources and "home rule" for Alaska. After instructing for Roosevelt, the platform says if he cannot be nominated then "delegates shall be free to nominate Robert M. La Follette or some other progressive candidate."
