

## STATE PROBE OF SAN DIEGO RESULTS IN REBUKE FOR I. W. W. AND VIGILANTES

### OFFICERS SCORED FOR NEGLECTING SWORN DUTIES

Commissioner Weinstein. Appointed by Governor Johnson Says Vigilantes Should Be Fined \$5000 Each Imprisoned 10 Years.

Perpetrators of Outrages Far Greater Criminals Than Those They Have Branded as Anarchists.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 18.—Stinging denunciation of the campaign of the I. W. W.'s at San Diego and an even more stinging denunciation of the "vigilantes" of that city, whom he convicts of un-American and uncivilized abuse of the disturbers of San Diego, with recommendation that the state authorities take a drastic hand in the war there, are the features of a 10,000 word report on San Diego conditions, sent today to Governor Johnson by Harris Weinstein, appointed as a commissioner to investigate the San Diego labor war.

Weinstein, in his report, roundly scored District Attorney H. S. Utley of San Diego for indifference to the reign of lawlessness and goes so far as to quote the federal statutes and practically recommends that all members of the San Diego "vigilantes" should be fined \$5,000 each and should be subject to forfeiture of all the privileges of an American citizen.

Worst of Criminals. "He has in the eyes of the law," said Weinstein of the San Diego vigilante, "made of himself a criminal—a far greater criminal than those whom he brands as 'anarchists,' 'revolutionists,' 'dynamiters,' and the scum of the earth'."

After an exhaustive examination of the causes of the I. W. W. conflict in San Diego, Weinstein found that it had been caused by a conspiracy of the I. W. W. to break up existing conditions there. His report points out, however, that though more than 200 arrests were made, not one was for drunkenness or disorder or for any other reason than that the I. W. W.'s persisted in acting against an ordinance prohibiting speaking within a restricted district, an ordinance, Weinstein clearly says is against the rights of any citizen.

Resembled Russia. "Your commissioner is frank to confess that when he became satisfied of the truth of the stories as related by these unfortunate men it was hard for him to believe that he was not sojourning in Russia, conducting his investigation there—"

### SCOTT BANKING PLAN BILL NOW IN CIRCULATION

W. J. Scott of Astoria is circulating initiative petitions for a bill for an act to provide funds to build good roads and to make other public improvements in Jackson county, Oregon, under what is known as the "Scott plan to save Jackson county \$90,000 a year in interest."

The bill provides for the appointment of seven men by the commissioners' court to act as the directors in the establishment and maintenance of a "Taxpayers national bank of Jackson county." The directors are authorized to form a national bank under the banking laws of the United States and then issue Jackson county bonds for \$1,500,000 for deposit with the treasury department which will issue currency.

Total of \$55,000 Contributed by Supporters and Admirers to Defray Campaign Expenses of Wisconsinite in His Struggle for Nomination.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 18.—"I will be nominated at Chicago," said Senator Robert M. La Follette here today when he addressed an audience of 1000 in Glentany park.

"It isn't always the man going into a convention who is nominated," he continued, reciting the cases of Garfield, Hayes and Harrison in proof.

### BAN JOHNSON STANDS PAT IN TIGERS STRIKE

President of League Says That Rowdism Will Not Be Tolerated—Cobb Should Have Appealed to Umpire or Police Asserts Magnate.

Crowd Demands Money Back and Leaves in Disgust When Tigers Fail to Appear in Game.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 18.—Rolling up a total of 24 runs on 25 hits, with a total score of 24 to 2, the Philadelphia Athletics this afternoon unmercifully defeated the makeshift team which Manager Hughie Jennings assembled to represent Detroit in the absence of Ty Cobb and the other regular players out on strike. Disgusted with the poor playing of the scrub team which Jennings played, 2000 fans left the bleachers during the first inning after the Athletics had scored three runs. The bleacherites rose en masse and demanded their money back.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, May 18.—Taking the stand that rowdism will not be tolerated among the players, Ban B. Johnson, president of the American league, in a formal statement this afternoon expressed surprise at the attitude shown by Ty Cobb and the other Detroit players. He said: "I am amazed at the stand taken by Cobb and his team mates toward the American league. Regardless of this, however, Cobb is indefinitely suspended. This does not mean that the order will be enforced longer than is absolutely necessary to investigate the affair."

"A player taunted and abused by a spectator need only appeal to the umpire to have the objectionable party ejected. Rowdism will not be tolerated in our organization."

### IRREGULARITY RULES IN STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, May 18.—Today's short session of the stock market opened with some irregularity. Canadian Pacific was off a point and Union Pacific and some of the trunk lines made fractional losses, Lehigh Valley and United States Rubber made slight gains. Union Pacific and Steel were in demand. In the final dealings Union Pacific, United States Steel and Amalgamated Copper gained a point.

The market closed steady. Bonds were firm.

### COMMERCE COURT COMES TO AID OF SHIPPERS OF FRUIT

WASHINGTON, May 18.—A decision which will save the fruitgrowers and shippers of California nearly \$1,000,000 a year was made known here today in the announcement that Judge John E. Carland of the commerce court denied the preliminary injunction sought by the Southern Pacific railroad against the latest decision of the interstate commerce commission in the litigation resulting from the pre-cooling and pre-icing cases recently started by the California citrus fruit growers.

It is estimated that Judge Carland's decision in upholding the interstate commerce commission against the railroad will save the California growers and shippers more than \$800,000 a year.

### DISRUPTION OF LEAGUE LIKELY

Detroit Tigers Back Up Star Player and Refuse to Play Unless His Order of Suspension is Modified—Other Teams Take Same Stand.

President Ban Johnson Refuses to Reconsider Ruling and War is Meeting of Players Called.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 18.—With Ty Cobb leading, the Detroit American league team left Shibe park in a body this afternoon, refusing to go on with the game with Philadelphia because Ban Johnson, president of the American league, refused to reconsider his decision suspending Cobb indefinitely for assaulting a spectator Wednesday at the game between Detroit and the New York team. It was predicted that this action will result in a baseball war which may disrupt the National and American leagues. The National league players are believed to sympathize with Cobb and the other Detroit players.

The Tigers, backing Cobb, and the Athletics, backing the Tigers, have brought their series for this week to a standstill, both teams standing pat today on their assertion that there will be no game unless President Johnson changes his ruling. They have issued a general call for the players everywhere in the American league to refuse to play if Cobb's suspension stands.

The Tigers and Athletics declare they are willing to compromise the matter if Cobb is fined or if his suspension is definitely limited.

### NAT GOODWIN HAS FIFTH WIFE

LOS ANGELES, May 18.—Friends of Nat Goodwin here today are trying to locate the much married actor to convey congratulations on his reported marriage to Miss Marjorie Moreland, apparently authentic news of which has been received here.

Several months ago it was reported here that Goodwin was engaged to marry Miss Moreland, who is an actress, but both Goodwin and the young lady denied the report. Late last evening while friends believed that Goodwin was en route to his home here after completing a New York engagement, telegrams were received that indicated he had married Miss Moreland and was bringing her to California.

Efforts today by friends of Goodwin to reach him by telegraph to confirm the report of his fifth marriage were fruitless. Goodwin is supposed to be in Chicago, where he had intended to stop on his way to Los Angeles.

### LA FOLLETTE FIGHTS FOR 3 OHIO DISTRICTS

BOWLING GREEN, Ohio, May 18.—Senator Robert M. La Follette left for Columbus today where tonight he will continue his fight against President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt for a portion of Ohio's delegation to the national convention. The Wisconsin senator is entering his fight in the Ninth, Twelfth, Twentieth and Twenty-first districts, and will be content if he can secure control of the delegates from these districts. In his address here last night, Senator La Follette referred to President Taft as an "amiable, easy-going fatman" and bitterly denounced Roosevelt, asserting that the latter's campaign is being financed by "representatives of big business."

### NAME SEIDEL RUNNING MATE FOR GENE DEBS

Socialist Convention Adopts Resolution Denouncing Judge Hanford for Interfering With Citizenship of Naturalized Citizen.

Former Mayor of Milwaukee to Make Run With Debs and Will Make Lively Campaign.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 18.—The socialist convention today adopted a resolution denouncing United States Judge Hanford of Seattle for his ruling in the Olsson case for "interfering with the citizenship and property of a naturalized citizen." Congressman Berger of Wisconsin was directed to bring the matter before congress.

Most of the morning session was spent by the delegates in wrangling over Asiatic immigration. Two reports, one favoring and the other opposing the admission of Asiatics, were presented. Delegates from the Pacific coast are bitterly fighting the adoption of the report favoring the admission of Asiatics. A vote on the reports will be taken tonight.

The insertion of the word "sabotage" in the constitution is condemned by many of the delegates and this has created ill-feeling between Congressman Berger of Wisconsin and many others.

Eugene V. Debs of Terre Haute, Ind., nominated late yesterday as a candidate for the presidency of the United States by the socialist convention and Emil Seidel, mayor of Milwaukee, nominated for the vice-presidency, announced here today that they would "make the campaign as lively as the capitalist parties had ever seen."

Debs was not in the hall when the result of the ballot was announced but the delegates were thanked by Emil Seidel. Both candidates were chosen on the first ballot.

### "NELLIE" FAILS TO SUBSTANTIATE TALE OF SLAVERY

Following an examination of the young woman known as "Nellie," who Viola Miller, otherwise known as Laura White, said the Chinese were endeavoring to bring into their power as they had her, by District Attorney Mulkey, the authorities are fearing a collapse of a white slave charge against Jim Ling or Wo Lee. "Nellie" has absolutely denied the story as told by Viola Miller. She declares that she never was in the Chinese laundry on Riverside avenue and that she knows Jim Ling, other than by reputation. She also declares that she has never used opium in any form.

It is reported that a number of persons have seen her entering the Chinese laundry on Riverside avenue. If this can be proven it will be known that she was untruthful when questioned by the district attorney. Her story is at absolute variance with the one told by Viola Miller.

"Nellie" came to Medford on orders of the authorities Thursday evening and returned to Ashland Friday following her examination by District Attorney Mulkey. She has removed her effects from the Royal rooming house.

The authorities are inclined to believe that representatives of the Chinese saw her at Ashland and forced her to tell the story she told the authorities. They had 48 hours in which to make their arrangements.
