

RALPH STACKPOLE WEDS YOUNG OAKLAND ARTIST

Ralph Stackpole, a promising young artist and a cousin of Mayor Robt. G. Smith of Grants Pass, and Miss Adele Barnes of Oakland, Cal., were quietly married last Friday, the 10th, in the M. E. church at North Beach, Cal.

Mr. Stackpole was born near Williams and lived in Grants Pass a number of years. At the age of 16 he attended the Hopkins Art school, San Francisco, and made such rapid progress that his friends advised him to attend an art school in Paris, France. He went there after the great earthquake in San Francisco, and attended an art school three years, taking the first prize in his masterpiece, the "American Farm."

Mrs. Stackpole is also an artist of high standing and has made many masterpieces in her line. She designed the costumes for the four hundred in the famous play at Berkeley a few months ago.
