

DILLER COMPLETES STUDY OF CRATER

The geological survey of the department of the interior has just issued a splendid 30 page booklet dealing with the geological history of Crater Lake. The pamphlet is by J. S. Diller who has worked for some time in this section and is replete with excellent views of the lake. The publication may be purchased from the superintendent of documents, government printing office, Washington, D. C., for ten cents.

Dr. Diller deals with the subject in a comprehensive manner but in one that is easily comprehended by the layman. He has high praise for the lake both from a scenic and geological standpoint. He concludes with these words: Considered with all its aspects Crater Lake ranks with the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, the Yosemite Valley and the Falls of Niagara, but with an individuality that is superlative.
