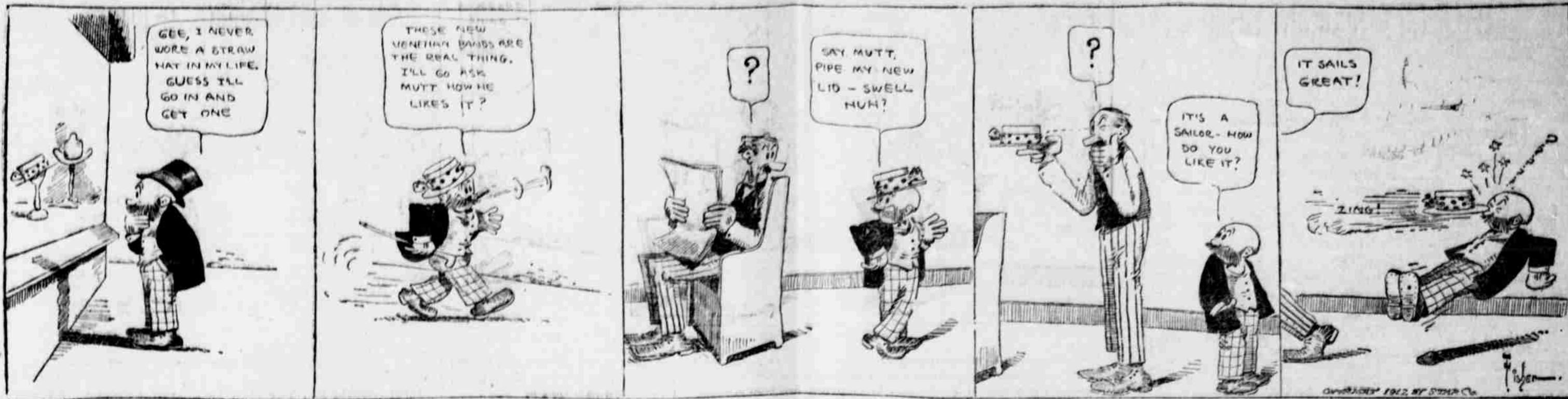


Mutt Was Either Jealous or Disgusted

SHIPPING CHERRIES FROM CALIFORNIA

California fruit distributors issue the following market letter under date of Sacramento, May 18: For the week ending the 17th, six carloads of cherries have been shipped, one car from Suisun, two part cars from Cordelia, making altogether one carload from this point, and the remainder from Vacaville. The first cars of this fruit are due to sell on Monday, one in New York and one in Chicago. Sales will follow with regular frequency from that time forward. In looking over the record of last season's shipment we find there were but three carloads shipped up to a corresponding date. The greater movement this season is entirely attributable to the fact that the crop of early cherries is better this year than last. The early varieties are now pretty well cleaned up in the early sections. A very considerable percentage of the shipments from Vacaville now consists of Tartarians. A few Centennials have made their appearance. A few Guignes are still offering and Chappans will probably last for another week. There has been no change in the condition of apricots, plums, prunes, peaches, Bartlett pears and grapes. Climatic conditions continue favorable. The weather is reasonable and reasonably warm.

LITTLE CHANGE IN LIVESTOCK MARKET

PORTLAND, May 20.—Receipts for the week were: Cattle, 529; calves, 67; hogs, 1378; sheep, 7268, and horses, 2. There was little or no change in the cattle market. In the face of very short receipts prices were stationary because of the fact that large killers had filled their pens. Butcher cattle sold at prices that might be considered a shade stronger than the week previous, but steers were steady. The hog market was steady to slow, with tops 6c lower than for last week. The demand was active and there was an early clearance throughout. On account of heavy receipts there was a soft sheep market. Prices were off to some extent but good sheep brought fairly good prices. An unusual condition prevails in the sheep supply this year because of early green food. Fat sheep are coming forward at a season when as a rule there is nothing of the class obtainable in the country. NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS. SEATTLE, May 20.—Petitions asking the recall of Mayor George F. Cotterill, elected last winter, were made public tonight. The principal charge is that he failed to give proper protection to citizens seeking to enforce respect for the American flag, the mayor having criticized the action of men who destroyed the red flag carried by socialists in the May day parade. It will require approximately 17,500 signatures to call the election, and so far as known none have been obtained as yet.
