UNITED STATES LIGHTHOUSE SHIP STRIKES ROCKS

CORDOVA, Alaska, May 21.—The United States Lighthouse tender America is ashore near Cape Hinchinbrook, being pounded to pieces by the waves. The thirty-two persons aboard the America, including seven officers, twenty-four men and one survivor of the crew of the lost barge Hayden Brown, were taken off by the steamship Admiral Sampson, which picked up a wireless distress signal of the government vessel. The Sampson is bringing the rescued men to Cordova. The reported loss of the America by wireless gave additional information that the America had solved the fate of the Hayden Brown, which was cut adrift by the tug Pioneer during the terrific storm off Prince William Land May 10. The Hayden Brown drifted ashore on Montague Island, near Entrance sound, May 12. Only two of the eight men aboard reached shore. One died the next day. August Palmer is the lone survivor.
