

GARDENERS HIKE FOR CALIFORNIA

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 23.—How fruit growing and truck gardening Italians are streaming into the state of California is shown in a census report received here from Washington today. The report shows that there are now 62,549 Italians in the state as against 22,774 in 1902, this element of the population having almost tripled in 10 years.

The report shows also that the Irish are concentrating about San Francisco bay and that the Germans are moving elsewhere.

That San Francisco is a more cosmopolitan city than Los Angeles, which has a greater percentage of native-born Americans than any other city on the Pacific coast, is also shown.

San Francisco has 120,822 foreign born whites, Los Angeles has 60,354, and Oakland 66,822, says the report.

KAISER LAUNCHES BIGGEST OF SHIPS

HAMBURG, May 23.—Kaiser Wilhelm today officially launched the liner Imperator, of the Hamburg-American line, declared to be the best and safest vessel afloat. The Imperator is 10 1-2 feet longer than the ill-fated Titanic of the White Star line, now lying at the bottom of the Atlantic.

The launching took place in the presence of a number of high government officials and a large throng cheered the vessel as she slid into the water.

German maritime authorities decreed while the Imperator was building that speed and luxury must be sacrificed to safety, and the huge liner carries a sufficient number of lifeboats to accommodate every passenger aboard.

AMERICAN TOBACCO IS FEATURE OF MARKET

NEW YORK, May 23.—American Tobacco, with a two point gain, was the feature of today's opening stock market. Outside of this stock, changes were only fractional. Heaviness was shown by the coalers and metal stocks. Practically all the leaders were under pressure. Later the market developed a slight degree of firmness, but closed heavy and irregular.

Bonds were steady.

DOCTORS CERTIFICATES NOW NECESSARY FOR WEDDINGS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 23.—All Episcopal ministers in the northwest will refuse hereafter to marry any person who cannot produce physicians' certificates that they are in sound mental and physical condition, if a resolution to be introduced this afternoon, by Mr. Rev. H. K. Howard of Hoquiam, Wn., is adopted by the United Clericus, in session here.

The United Clericus is composed of Episcopal ministers from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia.

CAPTAIN FINED FOR LACK OF WIRELESS MAN

NEW YORK, May 23.—Because he sailed with the liner Sabina minus a wireless operator, Captain Johnstone is out \$100 today. He paid that sum for the first violation on record of the wireless telegraph federal law passed June 24, 1911, which requires all vessels carrying more than fifty passengers to carry an operator and apparatus capable of sending messages at least 100 miles.

DARROW FIGHTS OVER 13TH JUROR

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 23.—With the courtroom packed and with every one keyed up to a high pitch anticipating the beginning of the presenting of testimony by the prosecution, the entire morning in the trial of Attorney Clarence Darrow on a charge of bribing a McNamara juror was taken up with the examination of talesmen for the position of alternate juror.

The attorneys, as well as the spectators, grew restless. Every one was anxious to see the first witness

called and the actual trial begun. A more determined fight has been made by both the prosecution and defense over the selection of the 13th juror than in the case of any of the regular members of the jury. Earl Rogers, chief counsel for the defense, disclosed at noon that the 13th was "hoodooish."

Five talesmen were examined during the progress of the morning session. Four were excused for cause. H. S. Calahan, furniture dealer of Long Beach, was under examination when court adjourned at 12 o'clock.

STEEL MERGER GREAT BLESSING FOR SOUTH

NEW YORK, May 23.—Asserting that the famous deal by which the Tennessee Coal & Iron company was taken over by the United States Steel corporation was a great blessing to the Birmingham district, causing improved working conditions for the men employed by the Tennessee company, as well as increased wages, Charles Perrine, ore expert, testified today in the suit brought by the United States government to dissolve the steel trust under the Sherman anti-trust law. The major portion of Perrine's testimony was purely technical.

E HUME THE DEAD TO SECURE FACTORY SITES

SEATTLE, Wash., May 23.—The county commissioners this morning decided to exhume eight acres of graves of dead persons to make way for a dozen factories which will soon be erected on the site at the poor farm at Georgetown. A crematory will be installed soon to burn all the exhumed bodies and to burn in the future all unclaimed bodies at the poorhouse.

DEMANDS \$100,000 FOR LOSS OF HIS WIFE'S AFFECTIONS

SAN FRANCISCO, May 23.—John Martin, millionaire clubman of San Francisco today is defendant in a \$100,000 damage suit brought by Edwin V. Smith, a wealthy business man who charges that Martin stole his wife. Smith wants \$50,000 for the alienation of Mrs. Smith's affections, and the same amount for loss of her actual presence. He was divorced from Mrs. Smith three months ago.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 23.—Launching along lines unprecedented in the religious history of the northwest, the "people's pulpit," a "church without a creed," today is organized by Rev. Albert Ehrigott, former pastor of the East Side Baptist church.

The Rev. Mr. Ehrigott parted from his former pastorate because of the dissension his work in the pulpit caused. Rev. Mr. Ehrigott charged that he was forced to leave the church because he is a socialist.

"Our only need will be to help another," said the "radical" minister today.

The new organization will meet Sundays in some Portland theater, where motion pictures will be shown and the pastor will deliver lectures on what he conceives to be the problems of practical Christianity.
