

## PREPARE CONTESTS FOR CONVENTION

CHICAGO, May 29.—Ormsby McHarg, the New York lawyer who is to conduct all Roosevelt contest for delegates before the national republican committee, today opened his headquarters here in the Congress hotel.

After a long conference with Roosevelt leaders McHarg asserted that the bitterest contest before the convention would be that for the delegation from Washington state. He charges that former Secretary Ballinger, former Senator John L. Wilson and others controlled the Washington state convention, despite a twenty-to-one sentiment in the state against President Taft.

Medill McCormick announced this afternoon that all Roosevelt national delegates were invited to confer with the former president next Saturday at Oyster Bay.

### CONGRESS THANKS THE CARPATHIA

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Formal thanks of congress to the steamer Carpathia's officers and crew for the rescue of the Titanic's survivors were expressed in a joint resolution adopted today by the senate. The house will take prompt action.

The resolution is the first of three measures introduced by Senator Smith of Michigan following his speech in the senate and the presentation of his report of the commerce committee investigation of the Titanic disaster. The resolution of thanks carries with it a gold medal to Captain A. H. Rostron, master of the Carpathia.

Two other measures were introduced and referred to the commerce committee. One was a bill requiring every steel ocean or coastwise seagoing steam vessel and every steel vessel navigating the Great Lakes, carrying 100 or more passengers, must have a water-tight skin board from the forward collision bulkhead not less than two-thirds of the length of the vessel, and the bulkheads so spaced that any two adjacent compartments may be flooded without destroying the floatability of the vessel.

## WEST CLASHES WITH CRAWFORD

SALEM, Ore., May 29.—Governor West and Attorney General Crawford today have clashed as a result of the governor's appointing Frank H. Curtis warden and acting superintendent of the state penitentiary here, replacing Warden James, whom the governor dismissed.

Attorney General Crawford is on record with an opinion that there is no authority for the appointment of an "acting superintendent" of the prison and that the Secretary of State should look to the approval of the State purchasing board for all supplies purchased rather than to the approval of Curtis. Governor West insists that notwithstanding Crawford's opinion, Curtis is the acting superintendent of the state prison as well as warden.

## PIONEER RESIDENT HAS PASSED AWAY

Mrs. Lucile Loosely, aged 79, of Fort Klamath, and well known throughout southern Oregon as one of its pioneers, died at her home Tuesday. She had resided in Oregon since 1850. Her son P. S. Loosely, was a resident of Medford for a number of years, moving to Central Point recently.
