

### STATE CLEAN-UP OF SAN DIEGO BY GRAND JURY

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 29.—Attorney General U. S. Webb, who was sent here by Governor Johnson to handle the I. W. W. situation, said today that he would make a general clean-up today of all preliminary matters in his investigation and would begin tomorrow to prepare specific cases for the consideration of the special grand jury which will assemble next week. That Webb will give the I. W. W. an equal hearing with the other parties to the controversy was indicated today when he said he would hear what Moore and Robbins, the I. W. W. attorneys, had to say and consider such matters as they might lay before him.

### FRAUD ALLEGED IN COLORADO PRIMARIES

DENVER, Col., May 29.—Insisting that the Evans-Guggenheim machine controlled the recent republican state convention in Colorado through the Denver delegation, which was fraudulently elected, E. P. Costigan, chairman of the progressive republican faction in Colorado today wrote to Chairman McDonald of the republican state committee demanding the re-convening of the state republican convention, the withdrawal of all instruction for President Taft and the re-consideration of the entire matter of electing delegates to the national convention.

Barnes Jr., "the boss" of the New York Republican machine, repeated today his former statements that the Chicago convention will determine whether the Republican party shall become a party of impulses or of deliberation. Barnes stated that it was not surprising that in some states the personality of Colonel Roosevelt impressed the voters, adding that the voters failed to realize the real significance of Roosevelt's candidacy.

### Patrol Your Pear and Apple Orchards For Blight

We have had reports from perhaps half a dozen sources stating that some new pear blight infections had been found. This means that a hold-over case exists in the neighborhood of these centers of infection. The infections so far found are not numerous, but any infection should be considered dangerous, and should receive the promptest attention. Even if an orchard has been entirely free from infection, that is no reason why it should not be carefully inspected every day or two during this season of possible infection. During the entire Spring, conditions have been most favorable for infections, and it has been only because of the very careful work that has been done that pear blight is not general this Spring.

A single infection let go may be the cause of a general spread of the disease through insect agencies. Such insects as leaf hoppers, aphides, click beetles, canker worms, or even ants and flies, may be carriers of infection. Infections at this time are usually very virulent, because of the favorable weather conditions which have promoted a strong growth in the trees. Furthermore, the absence of excessive sunshine tends to permit the germs of pear blight to live where otherwise they would be killed. For this reason, limbs or twig should be burned and not allowed to remain in the orchards where insects may have access to them.

### CONGRESS PLANS EARLY FINISH

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Prospects for an early adjournment of congress probably on June 15, were made brighter today, following informal caucuses of the leaders in both senate and house.

Voting is imminent on the tariff bills in the senate, as well as on the question of the legitimacy of the seat of Senator Lorimer of Illinois. Few speeches are expected to be made on the Lorimer question.

Remember that pear blight must not be trifled with. Unless caution is taken, a recurrence of former trouble with this disease may be the result. In California, where proper inspection and caution were allowed to lapse, the growers are now paying dearly for this neglect.
