REPORT MADE BY EXPERT UPON HARMON'S OFFICE

J. H. Wilson, the expert employed by the county court to audit the books of the county officials, has issued the following report on the financial condition of the office of Roadmaster W. W. Harmon. The period covered in the report is from April to September, 1911.

From April to September, 1911, there was issued warrants to W. W. Harmon, roadmaster, on his requisition, to pay road crews, surveys, freight, bridges and incidentals, the sum of \$45,286.55.

There was paid him in cash from donations, etc., as follows: From Crater Lake ass'n. \$ 2,500.00 From Col. Ray to apply on road 6,300.00 Alva ranch 4.50 Jacobsen-Bade company 56.88 Jacksonville, for culverts 81.00 Sale old bridge materials 5.00

\$8.60 in excess paid, \$85.77 in excess deposited. One check paid, balance in treasury. I have verified these payments by the documents of original entry, except the \$3000 delivered to the Columbia Bridge company in warrants and the discount for neither of which is any record available.
