# MEDFORD FIGHT FANS CHEER BUD ANDERSON TO VICTORY

KLAMATH FALLS, June 3.—(Special)—Cheered on by a large delegation of Medford friends, who are said to have realized handsomely on their faith in him, Bud Anderson of Vancouver, Wn., on Saturday evening knocked out Frankie Edwards of Oakland in the eighth round of a scheduled twenty round go. Anderson's friends at ringside from Medford were: Chick Wilson, Robert Brevard, C. H. Phelps, Ernest Webb, Ed Andrews and Frank Kane.

Edwards showed much of his old skill in the first round of the bout but by the end of the third it was apparent that he was not as good as when last seen here. He declares this is merely a temporary reversal of form and that the terrible pounding given him over the kidneys by his opponent in clinches was responsible for his defeat.

Although Edwards' seconds threw up the sponge to save their man from further punishment he had been knocked down four times and it would have been brutality to have allowed him to get on his feet again. Anderson was confident and steady throughout the match. He was master of the situation and knew it. Except for a slight bleeding at the mouth early in the bout he came out of the ring practically unharmed.

Young Anderson, Bud's brother, got a decision over Bobby Burns in a four round preliminary and Toby Miller knocked out Kid White in the first minute's fighting of a scheduled six-round preliminary.

**The Fight by Rounds**

First Round—They're off. Bud lands twice with his left. Clinch. Edwards lands right to head and gets left to body. Clinch. Edwards

drives right to face and they fall together. He hits Bud in the chin as he tries to get up. They mix furiously. Bud hooks a right on Edwards' face. Bud drives a furious blow to body and follows it with hard blows to kidneys. Edwards drives left to face.

Second round—Edwards leads to jaw. They exchange blows. Clinch. Bud hammering kidneys. Bud's nose is bleeding. Edwards drives blow to head. Bud hammers kidneys and lands left to face. Edwards lands left and right to face. Even round.

Third round—They mix furiously. Clinch. Bud hammers kidneys. Edwards lands two to face. Clinch. Edwards lands left to body. Anderson jabs. Clinch. Edwards lands right to head. Bud misses swing for head. Even round.

Fourth round—Edwards lands left for head and Bud blocks. Edwards jabs left to face. Bud knocks Edwards through ropes with hard left and is himself knocked off his feet in furious rush. Edwards rushes Bud to ropes. Bud lands hard blow to stomach. They mix furiously. Bud hammers kidneys. Bud jabs. Edwards lands right hook to head. Anderson hammers kidneys. Bud wards' round.

Fifth round—Bud lands straight jab to eye. Edwards hits in stomach. Edwards lands two to head and takes one in face. Anderson misses. Bud jabs. Even round.

Sixth round—Anderson hammers. Anderson lands right to head. They exchange blows to face. Anderson knocks Edwards into ropes with a series of right and lefts to face. Bud lands two lefts to face and hammers kidneys when Edwards goes into ropes. Edwards' left eye bleeding.

They clinch, Anderson hammering kidneys. Anderson lands another left to face. They clinch. Anderson's round.

Seventh round—Bud takes one on face and pounds kidneys. Bud hooks one to the head and again pounds kidneys. Bud blocks and hammers opponent with a series of rights and lefts to the face and chest. Edwards returns a few short arm jabs but is hanging on to the clinches. Edwards lands a hard right hook to the head. Edwards lands a left to the face and takes two short arm jabs to the chin. Edwards trips and goes down for nine counts. Anderson's round.

Eighth round—They exchange blows to the face and clinch. Anderson is forcing the fighting. They mix furiously. Edwards goes down for three counts. They clinch. Edwards tries to hit on the break. Anderson puts in telling blows to body. Edwards hangs on. Edwards goes down blow
