FRUIT PROSPECTS FOR CALIFORNIA

The California Fruit Distributors issue the following market letter under date of Sacramento, June 1. The following gives number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped from all points in California for the week (7 days) ending Friday evening, May 31, 1912. Cherries—12 1/2 cars by freight and six by express. Shipments should have shown a material gain this week but have not done so owing to stormy weather which prevented shipments for two or three days. Fruit is now going from all sections and is of considerably better quality than earlier in the season. In the early sections Tartarians are finished and the moment is principally of the later varieties such as Royal Anne, Centennial, Black Republican and Blings. There are still large quantities of Tartarians to go forward from the Santa Clara valley. Apricots—There are a few crates of apricots moving, but nothing of consequence. There should be considerable quantities moving next week and in ten days shipments should be in full swing. Plums and Prunes—No change to report in this variety since last week. The problem of thinning is proving a very expensive one in many districts and this work is being very generally prosecuted in order to make the fruit of desirable size. The reported drop in French prunes is confirmed and it is probable that same is not entirely finished yet. Peaches—There is practically no change in the peach situation. Complaint is made from the San Joaquin districts that there has been an unusually heavy dropping, especially of yellow peaches during the past ten days. Some varieties of clings are not at a full crop, but in spite of these facts there is in our opinion no reason for making any change in the estimate. Bartlett Pears—This crop continues in the same condition as last week. The fire blight, which was noted in our last letter, has been largely confined in its ravages to the early sections. Very little damage is reported from the river and none at all from the Santa Clara districts. As this condition was unquestionably brought about very largely by adverse weather conditions and as same have now changed, it is hoped the trouble will be checked.
