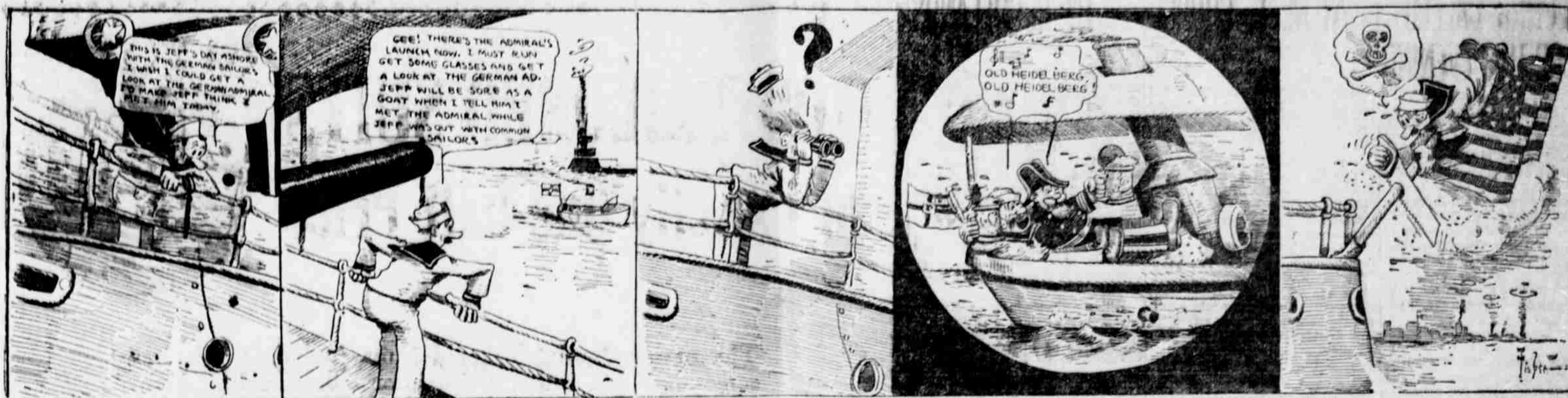


Jeff and the German Admiral Must Have Gone to Heidelberg Together
