Smith was introduced and delivered an address from the text, "Suffer the little children to come unto me," and in the course of his address he read a poem entitled "The First Children's Day," that was based on the scene in India calling forth the language in the text. At the close of his address we had a number of songs and recitations by the Sunday school scholars and then we adjourned for dinner.

Well, we had a dinner, a big dinner, and lots of it. After dinner we had the exercises of the program resumed and the first on the program was the rendering of some fine music by the Debeneger Gap orchestra, which is composed of the Misses Gage and their mother, and when they left the platform they were encored and then gave us another beautiful selection, then a quartette by Misses Eva Hall, Hazel Byrum and Misses Vincents, and they were also called back to the stand, then a song by Mrs. Chase's class of Antioch Sunday school consisting of 41 pupils, and they showed talent and training, then the Agate school came in for their part and Chappell school, etc., but the best part of the whole program was to hear the smaller members of the schools perform their part. It was a time long to be remembered by both young and old and we all hoped that the most of us may live to celebrate Children's day again on the second Sunday in June, 1913.

TAFT'S VETO TO SAVE PET BOARD

WASHINGTON, June 13.—President Taft will veto the "budget bill" unless provision is made to continue the operation of the commerce court. This is the word coming from the White House this afternoon. It is reported that the president also told the house leaders that he would veto the army appropriation bill unless the provision legislating Major Wood out of office is removed. It is reported that President Taft declared he will stay with congress here all summer rather than agree to these two provisions.

FREE LUNCH THORN TO LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, June 13.—All Los Angeles is divided against itself today. The split has occurred over a proposed ordinance snuffing the free lunch, revered by a large percentage of citizens.

Councilman Bethouski is leading the fight for the food faction. He declares that but twenty saloonmen in 299 favor the ordinance. Furthermore he threatens to bring in a petition signed by 10,000 voters who want the lunch maintained.

Saloonmen fighting the proposed law threaten to invoke the referendum if the council ignores their plea. Meanwhile saloon cuisine is improving daily, according to critics who claim to know.
