M'GOVERN CHOICE OF TEDDY FORCES FOR CHAIRMAN

COLISEUM, CHICAGO, June 17.—The Roosevelt people have decided on Governor McGovern of Wisconsin, instead of Senator Borah, as their candidate for temporary chairman, according to a statement just made by Borah to the newspapermen.
